## A River Bottom Diary September Passage

Part 10

A familiar call drifts with the first cool north wind under the fall September moon. It is a wavering, flute-like series of notes, musical and mysterious. It is a call familiar to me as it is to the Canadian farmer and the Argentine gaucho. For this place it is a song of September and of April, the song of a traveler, the call of the upland plover. The notes give me a start and I look up from my work with excitement to see the small speck in the blue sky. It moves from north to south, never pausing only announcing its passage and accenting the cool winds of fall. The excitement which the upland plover brings is not so much about the somber brown bird itself, but about the change of seasons and the aura of mystery that surrounds something so wild.

Current North American ornithology properly calls *Bartramia longicauda* by the common name of upland sandpiper, a change from the older upland plover. This correctly places the sleek, long legged bird with the sandpipers with whom it is most closely related. In its South American winter pastures it is called batitú, for its call. Upland plover is more poetic to my ear. The syllables roll off the tongue much as does the

graceful bird cloaked in basic brown, long in neck and wing. It stands tall in its preferred short grass pastures, and is swift and at home in the sky. It is handsome and completely unique in appearance. Unlike any other sandpiper, it carries itself with an aristocratic air and leaves the observer with the distinct impression that this is a special creation indeed. Perhaps its purpose on earth is to portray more than its existence alone.

As the bird disappears to the south another calls; migration is at hand. The second continues on its journey as well. Will they stop on the farm? Apparently not. Will they stop on this continent? Perhaps not. The pampas beckon. As they fade from my view the essence of Wild is revealed. How can we truly believe ourselves masters of the earth if we cannot by our own strength wing across the continent in a day, across the globe in a fortnight; and all with the grace of the wind in the great quiet of the blue sky such that a mellow call can startle the landlocked below. In such context our freedom seems an illusion and our power confined but that we could lift off at will and drift across the face of the earth. With such grace the upland plover's somber plumes seem fitting, for what use are bright colors when one is so free.

# Extralimital Dates: Ducks and Geese

This is the sixth in a series of reports on extralimital dates for migratory birds in our area. It is based exclusively on the Bird Study Group Bird Report data base. The intent of this series is to alert birders of the approximate arrival and departure dates of migrants (based on our data base) and of times during the year in need of better documentation. In some cases, permanent residents (PE) are included if annual data is incomplete. At least six dates (if available) are given for each species. For summer residents (SU) the first three dates are the earliest arrival dates in the spring and the last three dates are the latest departure dates in the fall. For winter residents (WI), the first three dates are the latest departure dates in the spring and the last three are the earliest arrival dates in the fall. The last column gives months for which additional data is needed. For non-resident migrants the first line (SP) contains the earliest three arrival and latest three departure dates for the spring and the second line (FA) gives the earliest arrival and latest departure dates for the fall migration. In some cases fewer than three dates are available for a given category. Accidentals (AC) contain only one or two records.

## MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING

September 12, 1995

President Jim Ingold announced that the elected Secretary would be unable to serve. A new secretary, Vernon Miller, was elected by the Board in his absence at the Board Meeting on September 5th. Since he was not present at the meeting, Jim asked for a volunteer to keep minutes.

Treasurers Report (Betty Mason): On June 13, 1995 the balance was \$827.89. At present the balance is \$1,162.75 in two bank accounts. Additionally, there is \$419.60 in the museum account for printing, and \$142.00 in an account at the Post Office.

Bird Report (Bobbe Womack and Will Smolenski): Directions for filling out bird reports were passed out at the meeting. Members were encouraged to call Bobbe or Will by the 15th to get bird reports in the newsletter. Late reports will go in the next newsletter. Even old reports can be added to the data base and should be turned in. Feeder reports are valuable as well.

Birding Hot Spots (Larry Raymond): A Hot Spot report on Cross Lake was published in the current newsletter. Hubert Hervey is working on a report for Bodcau.

Field Trips (Bill Hall): The list of field trips for the year were passed out in the meeting. There will be four field trips before the next meeting: September 23--National Hunting & Fishing Day at Bodcau; September 24--Aloha Quad with Charlie Lyon; September 30--Hawk Watch at the Hervey Dairy Farm; and October 7--Loggy Bayou Wildlife Management

Area Woodland with Bobbe Womack.

Fund Raising (Will Smolenski): Will announced that long-sleeved T-shirts and caps are now available. These will be available in the office area at each meeting.

Historian Librarian (Jim Ingold): The list of books has been lost. There are a number of books available for reference or check-out.

Hospitality (Betty Mason, Margaret Fontaine, Norma Cobb): The people who are doing this are tired and would like help. Volunteers are needed.

Membership (Shirley Huss): Renewals can be taken at the meeting. There are currently 107 paid members.

Newsletter (Mac Hardy): A volunteer to enter data would be helpful. This could be done at any time during the month. Additionally, there is a slide collection, and a collection of newsletters from other clubs which need to be organized. Submitted stories are welcome. The deadline each month is the 15th.

Beginning birders (Larry Raymond & Jim Ingold): Larry and Jim will set-up a special field trip for beginners on request. Techniques for birding, including use of binoculars, field guides, etc. can be covered.

Phone tree (Jeff Trahan): Jeff explained that this is used to report unusual sightings and spread the word to other members. He passed a sign-up list.

Programs (Gay Vekovius): Plans are proceeding for upcoming programs. The October program will be Top Ten Bird Stories of the Century by Hubert Hervey. Larry Raymond will discuss Native Plants to Attract Birds in November. Outside speakers are being contacted for future programs.

Publicity (Betsy Reisinger): Betsy will have to take a leave of absence for 3-4 months. Bobbe Womack will cover for her during this period.

Bodcau Bayou-National Hunting and Fishing Day Planning Group will meet on Tuesday, September 19, 1995 at 7:00 P.M. All interested volunteers are welcome. A list was circulated for volunteers to staff the booth on September 23rd.

#### Bird Talk

Dorothy Metzler from NETFO (Northeast Texas Field Ornithology) announced a project of developing a checklist for Caddo Lake based on actual sightings in last 10 years.

Paul Dickson reported seeing Caspian Terns on the Red River (a new lake in the area!). These birds were fishing. He has also seen a Forester Tern. In August Paul saw an adult Osprey on Red River. Since this is an unusual time of year, it may suggest that Ospreys are breeding in this area. Charlie Lyons saw an Osprey in July at the Caddo- Bossier Parish line. This was a summer record for him.

Bill Weiner requested assistance in encouraging the city to plant food plants in Betty Virginia Park.

Charlie Lyons reported seeing 6 Wood Storks at mile marker 130 on I-49. He has also seen a Juvenile Short Billed Dowitcher in that area.

Welborn Jack reported a flock of juvenile White Ibis and Snowy Egrets in the Bayou Pierre-Sandbeach area. Recently, they seem to have moved on.

Hubert Hervey had a Northern Oriole and Warbling Vireo at his farm today.

Rosemary Seidler has seen Summer Tanagers recently. Bob Womack reported migrating Scarlet Tannagers.

From his back yard Will Smolenski has seen 7 Mississippi Kites on an updraft.
