A River Bottom Diary

Part 11

With the first frost life changes overnight. Most seasonal things come gradually, but a few like great migrations and first frosts are moments of sudden change. November is the time for both.

In early November we witness the full scale arrival of the winter residents of this Red River Valley. Massive movements of birds take place. Some years this migration is only noticed by the increase in numbers at the feeders or of waterfowl on the ponds and on the river. Other years,

memorable years, the weather sets the stage for a one day massive passage of staggering magnitude. Such a passage occurred in the month of November this year.

The weather reports showed a major cold front stretching from the Rockies to the Great Lakes. In front of it was calm, balmy weather, nothing that would move a bird to leave what ever refuge it had settled into in the mild "Indian Summer" of October. Little serious weather changes had occurred for three weeks. Few migrants had passed since early October. The marsh had been empty since the blue-winged teal left a month before. Indeed the setting was right. This front carried cold and snow, inhospitable things to many south seeking birds. It also carried a fierce north wind, fierce that is to those locked to the ground. To those with miles to fly towards southern homes the north wind is a blessing. Such a wind saves many a million wing beats for the same number of travelers. Confirmation of my suspicions came first with the news that radar sites at airports across the Midwest were jammed by migrating birds. Tangible confirmation came at dawn on November 3rd, a day when a continent moved. I sat by the river and witnessed what I had not since a similar day eleven years earlier, and once before that fifteen more years back. The dawn lifted as a curtain to a stage; what was revealed was a continent in motion. The product of vast fields and waters, the dwellers of countless hidden places were revealed in the timeless spectacle of migration. From horizon to horizon were hundreds of birds, mostly waterfowl: geese, ducks of all species, sparrows, gulls, herons, virtually anything that could be seen at this place at that time passed overhead, over the head of a spellbound observer, over the head of human comprehension. To move such masses is a Godly thing. The morning is best described as a painting: a rosy dawn, a sky full of birds in classic v-shaped skeins, singles, pairs, small shapeless flocks, all in a uniform flow from north to south. The north wind stiffens and puts a shimmer on the water of the river, which sparkles in the new light. The chatter of hundreds of ducks, the honking of geese, the short, sweet calls of small passerines fill the quiet atmosphere. By sunrise 25,000 birds had passed by in view. As the sun climbed over the trees the spectacle ended, the curtain closed. Sparrows dropped into the grass, ducks fell to the flooded woods. Only the snow geese continued to pass over throughout

the morning. Novembers to come hold promise of more such sights, but I am left wondering what must have passed this spot before Novembers were counted, before marshes were drained and prairies plowed. What multitudes passed this spot when this place was theirs alone. Migration is timeless, these creatures are timeless. First frosts are as well.

The mass migrations are frequently ahead of cold, clear arctic air which brings the first frost of the year. Usually for the farm this is greeted as a time of change from pastures to hay and feed for the livestock. For the birds it is more a fulfillment of the season, for they are ready and awaiting.

The early morning is crisp and clear, the frost adorns all green things across the fields. It looks deceptively harmless on the remaining summer grasses and weeds. It covers them so lightly, so delicately but completely. Shortly after sunrise it vanishes as if never there. By noon its seeming innocence also vanishes and its incredible might is revealed. As sudden as the mass migration of birds, is the mass withering of all that lingers green into November. Only the newly emerging winter grasses are left. The fields wither, then yellow. By the next day the landscape is hardly recognizable as the same one a day before. Winter has come in a night. Several more frosty mornings follow. The last leaves of the pecan, hackberry, osage orange, and cottonwood are vanquished from their limbs. The sparrows seem more at home now in their brown and umber refuge. They seem to have swelled in number as well. The land is neatly put to rest. The winter birds have come. The trees are bare, all that is left is the coming of the cold and winter rain. Water pipits are in large flocks in the alfalfa field. Over 200 green wing teal rest on the marsh. A dozen white crowned sparrows hop about the road. All seem to have been there before; to have been there all along. But only days before things were green and warm, in transition. The first frost brings sudden change as did the north wind and its mass migration; but change in what context? Indeed the less these things change the better when viewed in the greater scope of time. Perhaps nothing changes in that context but the observer.

Extralimital Dates: Wild Turkey through Terns

This is the seventh in a series of reports on extralimital dates for migratory birds in our area. It is based exclusively on the Bird Study Group Bird Report data base. The intent of this series is to alert birders of the approximate arrival and departure dates of migrants (based on our data base) and of times during the year in need of better documentation. In some cases, permanent residents (PE) are included if annual data is incomplete. At least six dates (if available) are given for each species. For summer residents (SU) the first three dates are the earliest arrival dates in the spring and the last three dates are the latest departure dates in the fall. For winter residents (WI), the first three dates are the latest departure dates in the spring and the last three are the earliest arrival dates in the fall. The last column gives months for which additional data is needed. For non-resident migrants the first line (SP) contains the earliest three arrival and latest three departure dates for the spring and the second line (FA) gives the earliest arrival and latest departure dates for the fall migration. In some cases fewer than three dates are available for a given category. Accidentals (AC) contain only one or two records.

Hot Spots: The committee will meet and arrive at some kind of consensus regarding publication of Hot Spots.

Field Trips: The "Big Day" will be discussed at the regular meeting. Also a list for the Hervey Hayride is needed.

Librarian: Birds of Chokecherry Video available for \$25.00. A list should be made of books and bird checklists in library for next newsletter.

Membership: We have 104 members, not including gratis members. A reminder for members to pay dues has been sent.

Newsletter: Answers to the Bird Quiz are on a different page of the newsletter. The front page of the newsletter has been put on Internet, and more pages will be added to Internet this month. Louisiana Tourist Bureau should be added to the mailing list.
