A River Bottom Diary

Part 12

A cold January wind blows this dawn. The ink black night imperceptibly fades into a soft, cold gray light. With ashen overcast skies, sunrise is only an assumption. A harrier sits nestled in the hayfield, his night's wait nearly over. Hidden in a vast expanse of dried grass he avoids the dangers of the night as a needle in a haystack. All night he has heard the rustling sounds of prey while lying on the very same ground as they. With the growing light the calls of sparrows ring throughout the field. The harrier springs into the air. In a moment he has thrown the shackles of the night and ascended to his airy throne.

With strong thrusting strokes he climbs skyward until the chosen height is attained. Now over the bayou he swings around and floats back to the hayfield. The field was planted in pearl millet and hayed three times over the summer. The final stand was left as much weedy johnson grass had invaded. The result was a light stand of seedy grass with an open understory and stiff clusters of millet heads here and there. This provides a very different environment than the dense weeds of the fields which were never cut. On this hayfield the harrier stakes his winter claim.

Wings arched back into the harrier's characteristic dihedral he floats against the north breeze. Muted by soft gray plumes he parts the air without a sound. His colors are those of the winter sky, his passing is as a ghost. Only his eyes betray the fierce intent of his purpose. Sharp as diamonds they pierce the matrix of stalks and blades searching for what might dare to move. Ears equally alert, he hears the high pitch tinkling call of a shrew, hunting on another level. A puff of wind deflects from the ground, another gust swirls around. The surface is rarely smooth yet the harrier rides the pool of air, ever alert. The gust parts the soft feathers of his right wing, he checks with a twist back right, then thrusts downward with his long tail, stemming the coming stall. On he glides, fine tuned to ride upon an ocean of air whose swells and currents are known only to those who fly. He banks upon reaching the treed fence row and turns about in

the wind. Suddenly a motion ahead triggers the predator's response; in a swirling dive he descends like a leaf caught in a whirlwind but to a precise point he falls only to narrowly miss; a cotton rat flees. Again he pumps skyward and resumes the hunt. Floating across the wind he checks into it until nearly motionless and then drifts back along its edge once again. A LeContes sparrow darts through the grassy maze; under the canopy it is safe. As the sparrow crosses an opening, the harrier strikes. Talons end the sparrows' journey as the harrier climbs skyward, his first meal firmly grasped.

He alights on the open ground of the newly planted alfalfa field. His first bite takes the head, then limb by limb with ravenous intent, he feeds.

I watch the harrier often. He misses more than he succeeds. In his misses he shows patience or perhaps resolve. In his successes he shows an urgency, a need as if another meal may be long in coming and as if he must hurry lest this one should be taken from him.

After finishing the sparrow, the harrier sits for quite sometime, looking about as if hoping to find a last piece. I walk toward him marking the clod on which he sits. Intolerant of my presence he leaves the field and strokes swiftly over the bayou and out of sight. Quickly striding to the spot I can only find a few breast feathers. Nothing is left to waste.

Turning my attention to the hayfield, I see that this incident is already past. The sparrows are perched high on the stalks, some singing others just sitting in the morning light. The field is good habitat, full of the seeds of johnson grass and millet. The sparrows are many, mostly savannah sparrows but I also find LeContes, swamp, Lincoln's and song sparrow. Along the trees at the edge of the field are white-throated, white-crowned, and more song sparrows. A flock of goldfinches comes in from high and alights on the tops of the grass stalks. Later in the morning, hoards of blackbirds swirl upon the field.

So much life, so much tragedy, lies in so simple a place. Lives depend on and lives end on a field of dead grass.

Later that day, I pass the hayfield again. The harrier is perched upon a roll of hay. He is

feeding. Pausing, I focus my binoculars to see him tear a long piece of hispid cotton rat and swallow it in an exaggerated gulp. His life is spared once more.

Along the ditch, which borders the hayfield and the main road on the farm, grow thick stands of ragweed and scattered osage orange trees, "bow-darcs" by local tongue. White-crowned sparrows along with a number of other species find refuge in this brushy row. Some of the white-crowned sparrows are feeding in the road this gray afternoon, while others sing from the thorny branches of the osage orange. Suddenly all freeze, then dash for cover as a blue-backed, long tailed missile streaks amongst them. The cooper's hawk nimbly twists down the ditch and flares upward then swoops down again with fantastic speed and agility. He pierces the brushy refuge and sweeps in and out in a frantic attack. Another pass and then without pausing or looking back, continues straight ahead across the hayfield over the bayou and out of sight. The attack is over. The sparrows reappear, all facing the direction of the accipiter's departure. As he disappears from sight, the singing resumes, others hop back in the road and return to feeding. As quickly as this drama begins, it ends. Life goes on.

In all this drama who is to be pitied? It is human nature to side with the meek, indeed that is the noblest of human inclinations. But as I watch the sparrows calmly feed, finding seeds readily, singing unconcerned throughout the day, it is the hawk that seems more deserving. His meals are never known until the moment his talons close. The hawk is the master of the sky, but with that high and powerful throne comes a life always on the edge of desperation. The swift cooper's hawk is always one twisting turn away from a high speed crash. The harrier is never more than a fortnight away from starvation. Their complex weapons and awesome mastery of the air are indeed their bonds. For they must use them all in intense resolve every day of their lives, or lose their lives. Likewise the sparrow can never let down its guard. No, in nature there is balance; none are to be pitied so long as there are weedy fields and ditches. Pity must be spent on those who seek such winter homes but find only barren places that harbor no life at all.

As darkness softly falls this gray wintry day,

the harrier swoops low over the center of the hayfield and all at once falls quietly into it. The chirping of the sparrows subsides. Night returns to the farm.

Extralimital Dates: Larks through Starlings

This is the eighth in a series of reports on extralimital dates for migratory birds in our area. It is based exclusively on the Bird Study Group Bird Report data base. The intent of this series is to alert birders of the approximate arrival and departure dates of migrants (based on our data base) and of times during the year in need of better documentation. In some cases, permanent residents (PE) are included if annual data is incomplete. At least six dates (if available) are given for each species. For summer residents (SU) the first three dates are the earliest arrival dates in the spring and the last three dates are the latest departure dates in the fall. For winter residents (WI), the first three dates are the latest departure dates in the spring and the last three are the earliest arrival dates in the fall. The last column gives months for which additional data is needed. For non-resident migrants the first line (SP) contains the earliest three arrival and latest three departure dates for the spring and the second line (FA) gives the earliest arrival and latest departure dates for the fall migration. In some cases fewer than three dates are available for a given category. Accidentals (AC) contain only one or two records.

MINUTES OF THE JANUARY MEETING

On January 6, 1996, the regular meeting of the SSNS Bird Study Group was held on the LSU campus. The meeting opened at 7:11 p.m.

President Jim Ingold welcomed visitors to our meeting.

The program for the evening was "Birding Russia" by Jim Ingold and Vickie LeFevers. They were in Russia this past summer, but there were not as many birds as they had hoped to find. Jim gave a slide presentation on the birds they saw. They were quite disappointed that a House Sparrow was one of the first birds they saw. Vickie gave a video program that she described as more of a travelogue which was very interesting. If you are planning a birding trip to Russia, Jim and Vickie recommended taking a guided tour.

Committee Reports

Treasurer's Report - Betty Mason - Last month's balance was \$1,888.50, Income was \$514.00, Expenses were \$79.07, leaving a balance at Hibernia of \$2,363.43. Proceeds from the auction were \$452.00, Gift Shop \$172.01 and \$57.21 in the Post Office fund.

Some members who bought items at the Christmas auction forgot to pick them up.

The next field trip will be on January 27th to Soda Lake. Meet Larry Raymond at 7:30 a.m. at What-a-burger on North Market.

The Winter LOS will be held January 19th to January 21st in Lafayette.

The Cross Lake Barge Trip has been rescheduled by Chuck Moffett for February 3, 1996.

Newsletter - Mac Hardy asked that we turn in bird reports early and give all information to him as soon as possible.

New Business

Paul Dickson has BCBCBC reports for the last eight years. Awards for 1996 are as follows:

HIT LIST - Birds difficult to find - Hubert & Pat Hervey

NO DOZE - Awards birders who diligently count every bird - Charlie Lyon for 539 Killdeer.

IRON BINOCULARS - General toughness in birding and hours put in - Paul Dickson and Bruce Crider

GOLDEN BIRDIE - Award for the best bird - Bill Wood for the Wilson's Warbler.

Paul said that because of the Red River project, habitat has changed dramatically ecologically, for instance, on the BCBCBC, Paul and Bruce found 400 Canvasbacks, up to 2,000 Lesser Scaups and 1000-1500 Ring-billed Gulls.

Charlie Lyon said the Shreveport Christmas Count had a total of 105 species. A new area is 12-mile Bayou where Meadowlarks, Horned Larks and American Pipits were found. Heretofore, there were 8 or 9 parties for the count, but this year there were only 7 parties. On Cross Lake, there were 9,600 Double-crested Cormorants, 308 Great Egrets and 1300+ Cedar Waxwings. Because of residential development, Shreveport's count has a potential of only 112 - 115.

Dorothy Metzler faxed the Christmas Count of Caddo Lake showing 105 species.

Brazoria, Texas will have a migratory count on April 18, 1996.

Rosemary said that she, Hubert and Pat took part in the Natchitoches Christmas Count and had over 90 species. Also, she always does the New Orleans Christmas Count in which they had over 145 species with 5 species of hummingbirds.

At the Board Meeting last week, Jim brought up the news that an 8' long by 2' wide permanent sign/banner would cost \$140.00. Some possibilities include **Rufous-capped Warbler**, **Varied Bunting**, **Painted Bunting** and **Lazuli Bunting**. He had handouts on Victor's Birding Trip of Chalk Bluff and other possibilities. 2. **Boblinks** are seen in Louisiana usually only in spring. In the fall they migrate in the east through Florida.
3. There are no breeding records for Louisiana.
4. **Bobolinks** spend the winter in South America east of the Andes, in the Pampas.
5. Among the colloquial names for the **Bobolink** are ricebird, butter bird (because they get fat on rice), and skunk blackbird (based on the color pattern of the male).
6. Both **Bobolinks** and **Horned Larks** sing their song while in flight. The song flight of the **Horned Lark** however, is more dramatic.
7. **Bobolinks** breed in hayfields and wet areas.
8. Five eggs are normally laid but clutch size may range from 3-7.
9. A male **Bobolink** in alternate (breeding) plumage has 3,235 feathers.
10. The female builds the nest.
