Since 1991, Lynn has worked on the Winn Ranger District of the Kisatchie National Forest where her primary duties focus on management of the endangered **Red-cockaded Woodpecker**, restoration of pitcher plant bogs and prairies, and management of white-tailed deer and **Wild Turkeys**.

Saturday, January 18, 2003, 2:00 p.m.

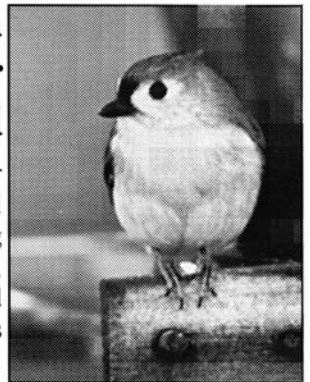

Any of our resident owls, including **Barn**, **Barred**, **Great Horned**, and **Eastern Screech** are possibilities in this neighborhood. The **Barn Owls** have their own nesting platforms at the WMA. Participants should be aware of the following requirement of the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries:

2003 LOS WINTER MEETING

After 10 years the LOS Winter Meeting will return to Lake Charles from Friday, January 24 though Sunday, January 26, 2003. The LOS is fortunate to have as our Saturday evening speaker, Kelly Bryan, who will give a presentation on "Birds of the Davis Mountains." Kelly's program will characterize and describe the Davis Mountains, comparing them to other mountain ranges in the region. He will present other important aspects of this area's avifauna, including tape recordings of songs of selected bird species.

Kelly, obtained a Master's Degree from Sam Houston State University and began his career with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Service at Huntsville State Park. He went on to serve 18 years as Superintendent for Kickapoo Cavern and the Davis Mountains State Parks. He was then appointed Coordinator of Natural Resources Management for all of the western Texas State Parks. He retired from this position in 2002. His wide personal interests include banding and drawing birds, photography, recording bird songs, and serving as Chief of the Volunteer Fire Department.

Kelly's intensive studies of the avifauna of the Davis Mountains began in 1991 and continue today. His

investigations have led to the discovery of one species new to Texas.

The Davis Mountains of western Texas have been characterized as one of the last ornithological wildernesses in the state. Unlike the nearby Guadalupe and Chisos Mountains, which are included in the national parks, the Davis Mountain range has remained almost entirely privately owned.

The discovery of nesting **Buff-breasted Flycatchers** there in 1999 provided a new species to the state's bird list, as well as a first nesting record. Photographs obtained of the **Olive Warbler** (1992), **Berylline Hummingbird** (1997), and the **Slate-throated Redstart** (1997 and 2000) represent the first documented records for Texas. Additional first Texas nesting records include the **Gray Flycatcher** (1991), **White-eared Hummingbird** (1993 probable), **Mountain Bluebird** (1995), **Dusky Flycatcher** (2000), **Greater Pewee** (2002), and **MacGillivray's Warbler** (2002) as well as many other important records/observations of birds.

Our Friday evening speaker will be our own Dr. Jim Ingold, Professor of Ornithology from the Department of Biological Sciences, LSU in Shreveport. Jim also serves as Editor of the *Journal of Louisiana Ornithology*. His talk will be the "History of Louisiana Ornithology," the paper he presented in 2002 at the North American Ornithological Conference in New Orleans.

Jim said that while working on an annotated bibliography of Louisiana ornithology, he became interested in Louisiana's role in the science of ornithology from pre-history to Audubon, and from Edmund McIlhenny to George Lowery of LSU and his students, on up to 2002. Many of our state organization members should be very interested in the talk, as they have lived through part of this history!

LOS Winter Meeting Field Trips

All-day trips will leave at 7 a.m. and return at 5 p.m. Half-day trips will run concurrently and each will be conducted three times (Saturday from 7 a.m. until noon, Saturday 1 p.m. until 5 p.m., Sunday 7 a.m. until noon.)

Departures will be from the rear parking lot of the hotel by convoy in personal cars. Each field trip leader will have a colored flag to coincide with the color assigned to that trip. At registration, attendees will be given color tickets for their chosen trips.

All-Day Trip (Red)

Cameron via Highway 82 West Beach, Sabine Lake and Pleasure Island (Port Arthur, TX), Tyrell Park and Cattail Marsh (Beaumont, TX). Trip will be split into two groups. Group A will begin with Cameron Beach and proceed to other places. Group B will go directly to Tyrell Park and Cattail Marsh then come back by Sabine Lake and Pleasure Island and last to Cameron Beach. Birds to see: waders and shore birds, hawks, **Golden Eagle**, loons, kites, **Spotted Sandpiper**, woodpeckers, ducks, **Canvasback**, **Ring-necked Duck**, scaup, **Common Goldeneye**, **Bufflehead**, **Ruddy Duck**, mergansers, and grebes.

Half-Day Trips

Carlyss area (Green) 1133 ponds, State Highway 108, Choupique, Gum Island, Fabacher, Gum Cove, Charlie and Ellis Moss roads to Ellender Bridge, Ship channel, DeVail Road to Erwin Oil Field. Birds to see: ducks, **Anhinga**, sparrows, kites, hawks, **Crested Caracara**, wading birds, shorebirds, rails, **Black-crowned Night-Herons**, and **Black Skimmers**.

East Calcasieu Parish (Yellow) Rice Fields east of Municipal Airport, Lionel Derouen, Fruge', Rossignal roads, Highway 14, Lacassine NWR Pools, Lacassine NWR Headquarters and Streeter Road. Birds to see: ducks, geese, wading birds, shorebirds, sparrows, hawks, **Vermilion Flycatchers** and other migrants.

Northwest Calcasieu Parish (Blue) Grey Road to Ged and Ged Lake, WPA Road, Houston River Road, Navajo Trail, Big Woods, Route 66, Marcantel Road. Birds to see: sparrow, woodland birds, wrens, hawks, woodpeckers, **Greater Roadrunner**, nuthatches, and other migrants.

AFTER MOONSET, BEFORE SUNRISE

The darkest time of day and my favorite time of day is after the moon has slipped beneath the horizon, yet before the sun has had a chance to shed any light at all on the day to come. The temperature gauge on the mirror of my vehicle read 28 degrees F. Not bad at all since I was fortified with steaming hot chocolate and warm wraps. All the meteorites were shooting toward the east. Some were large and disappeared into the trees before burning up. Then I watched as one shooting star passed by like a vehicle going the wrong way on a one-

way street. I wonder how it could do that? Go due west like a contrary heifer refusing the round up. Not a breeze stirred the tree leaves, no roaring and crashing of motor boats heading to the duck blinds disturbed the peace, just the hooting of the **Barred Owls**, that noisy nocturnal bird of prey.

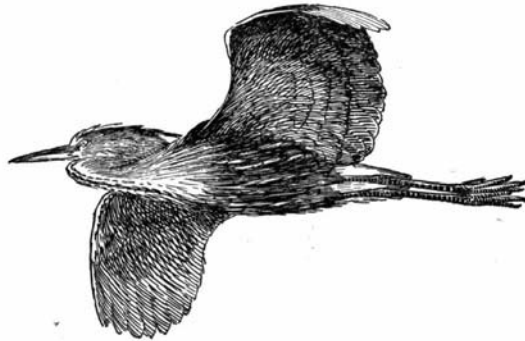
The time came to walk the half-mile of abandoned oil-well road that would bring me to the place where I had learned to best enjoy the start of my small portion of the Shreveport Christmas Bird Count. Almost imperceptible was the gradual disappearance of the dimmest of the stars, as there was a hint of daylight. The starry sky with its shooting stars gave way with reluctance. The **Eastern Screech-Owl** was still responding to my imitation of his calls, which don't resemble screeches at all. The whooo-whooo-whoo-who-whoing of that very crepuscular owl that we call the **Great Horned Owl** came from the shore of Cross Lake. A **Great Blue Heron**, still invisible in the near dark, squawked his upset with my presence. Little did I guess that was the only **Great Blue Heron** I would see for the next eleven hours. This was the place, right beside Quad-Paw Bayou, where about twenty years previously, on the same bird count, I had watched a mink dive into the ice creating a hole with his paws before his nose could crunch into the thin iced-over surface. He had watched me with suspicion through a lifted up piece of ice, until he decided I was not a menace. The temperature that morning years ago had been 5 degrees and I had surely been cold. Finally there was enough light to discern an **Orange-crowned Warbler**, along with the usual **Carolina Chickadees**, **Tufted Titmouse**, **Golden-crowned Kinglets**, **Ruby-crowned Kinglets** and other winter birds of the Louisiana forest.

Splash came gently from the bayou, followed by more rhythmic splashes, fairly evenly spaced. With my great woods lore I deduced that a canoe was approaching from the lake. But I espied not a boat. Well then, it must perchance be a hunter in hip boots, but obviously the second half of duck season did not start this morning, or the air would already be filled with the frequent boom of shotguns and the quacking of duck hunters testing their calls in the near dark. No hunter appeared. But a pair of otters did. They were swimming upstream and surfacing in unison like dolphins. The splashing was the sound of them surfacing and diving. As they passed by, they separated to opposite sides of the small bayou and then

met in the middle with renewed splashes. I was thankful for the wonderful experience and the gift of appreciating nature.

A small, dark **Winter Wren** gave a loud, high at me or maybe at the crack, that almost sounded like a .22 rifle. A couple of hounds were baying and maybe the hunter had found a squirrel. Crack again, but more like a thud than the sound of a gun. Splat again, coming from up the bayou and getting closer. The head of the beaver appeared in mid-bayou as he headed toward Cross Lake. Opposite my side of the bank he gave one last splat, almost managing to startle me. The splashed bayou water droplets reached my bank. I think he laughed out loud.

After adding a dozen more birds to my list, I reluctantly headed back down the long trail westward to the car. I would have over forty species of birds listed before leaving the Quad Paw Hunting Club area. Looking back over my shoulder to the east I observed the red sun, only half showing above the horizon, and couldn't help but think about how lucky I had been to have such an enjoyable dawning.



GOOD BIRDING AREAS CLOSED

While doing the Caddo Lake Winter Bird Count I've always looked forward to birding the Jeems Bayou WMA. That area can only be reached by boat now. The oil pipe bridge has been cut in two. Obviously on purpose, because a cutting torch has been used to cut out one section which has been dragged onto the bank. This area was scheduled to be in the new edition of *Hot Spots*, but that is pointless unless the bridge is to be repaired in the future.

Another area familiar to me because of CBC work is closed. The Rice Road Farm Lake has been drained and is waterless. The owners have opened a dirt pit and are selling the dirt to GM. The pit is located below the large lake, but is scheduled later on to be a new lake. Then the silted-in old lake (100 acres or so) is to be made into a dirt pit, containing lots of silt. The old lake was 115 years old, but is now just dry dirt, soon to be dirt pit. Time changes everything.

SHREVEPORT GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT FOR 2002

The Christmas Bird Counts of 2002 have been compiled and the North American Migration Count is still several months away. It's February and you're having count withdrawal symptoms. You wax nostalgic over memories of arising at 4:00 a.m. to meet your CBC team to listen for owls calling before dawn. You regale anyone you can corner with endless stories of the counts you've participated in, from how you found that rare bird to where the best restrooms are in your circle. You practice estimating individual numbers of large flocks of constantly moving birds by counting the **House Sparrows** in your backyard. But it's not enough; you've got count fever and it seems to be incurable. Birders, take heart! Salvation is at hand! It's time for the Great Backyard Bird Count of 2003!

Originally conceived as a count of 100 common "backyard" birds, the GBBC was expanded at the behest of participants to include all birds sighted during the count period, whether in the backyard, the front yard, or twenty miles down the road. Last year's Great Backyard Bird Count was a "great" one for northwest Louisiana. Shreveport topped the list of Louisiana cities in total number of species sighted with 90 over the four-day count period. With 15 more species, Shreveport would have been in the top 10 cities in number of species reported in the entire United States. The only other northwest Louisiana city in the Louisiana Top 10 was Keithville, which reported 52 species. What's especially significant about the Keithville numbers is that they were all reported by one observer, the BSG's own Bill Wood.

This year, co-sponsors, Audubon and the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, are asking participants to pay special attention to birds on the Audubon WatchList. Once again, Nancy and Lily are compiling a birding "hit" list for northwest Louisiana and we'd like your help in getting these species into the GBBC database. Hit list birds are selected from the Audubon WatchList 2002 and unusual bird species currently wintering here. "Most Wanted" birds for this year include **Short-eared Owl**, **Vermilion Flycatcher**, **Bald Eagle**, and wintering hummers.

We're using the BSG database to determine areas where hit list birds might be located and to create a species "locator grid." This grid will be published in the February newsletter. We'd like interested members to select a most wanted species and bird the most likely locations for the targeted bird one, two, three, or all four

of the count days. You're on your own schedule here; bird for as little or as long as you want.

GBBC data can be entered online at www.birdsource.org/gbbc. If you are not online, you can turn in your birding list to Nancy Menasco at 868-3255. For the GBBC, bird sightings are reported by zip code. To find a zip code for a particular birding location, go to <http://www.usps.com/zip4/welcome.htm>. You will need to know a street or road name, but not an exact address. If you can't find a road name (Parish Road 100 won't work), ask somebody who lives along the road what the zip code is. We did just that last year and were very surprised to learn that the Bayou Pierre WMA road where the Barn Owl platforms are located is in zip code "71115" and is, therefore, considered to be in Shreveport as far as the GBBC is concerned. This is even more interesting when you consider that the WMA is in Red River Parish. If you don't live in or near a town big enough to have its own zip code, you just get swallowed up by some big city that takes all the credit for your birds.

Be sure to report your GBBC sightings to the BSG database as well, but also note exactly where you saw each bird on your list. Using a zip code for location here could cause just a little confusion for BSG database users. As an example, let's continue with the possibilities for zip code "71115" and let's say your list includes the following: **Short-Eared Owl**, **Barn Owl**, **Swamp Sparrow**, **Vesper Sparrow**, **Bewick's Wren**, **Ring-billed Gull**, and **Bald Eagle**. Did you see those owls in Towne South Subdivision or on Yearwood Road? Does that seem like a silly question? Then what about the sparrows and the wren - Bishop Point, Yearwood Road, or one of half a dozen other possible spots? Consider the gull and the eagle - LSUS parking lot or Bishop Point? Not quite as obvious, is it? **Ring-billed Gulls** may be seen at both locations just about anytime you care to look in February. The eagle might seem a highly unlikely bird for LSUS, but picture this. You're standing on one of the athletic fields gazing across the levee during a lull in the action in your child's soccer game. What do you see soaring over the river? It's a, it's a, IT'S A **BALD EAGLE!** Case closed. If you have questions about how to turn in your list to the BSG, call Mac Hardy at the LSUS Museum at 797-5338.

To learn more about the GBBC, read the article that follows or visit the website referred to above. Get out there and bird. Have a good time. Turn it into a scavenger hunt and take your friends, remembering the birding code of ethics at all times, of course. Or have

your own Great Backyard Bird Counting party instead. Invite a couple of neighbors for tea and cookies, fill your bird feeders, and watch from the warmth of your own house.

However you choose to become involved, whether alone or with a group, we hope you'll join us for the Great Backyard Bird Count, starting Valentine's Day, February 14, 2003.

6TH ANNUAL GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT FOR 2003

All across North America, birds face survival challenges ranging from loss of habitat to introduced predators and diseases such as West Nile virus. The 6th Annual Great Backyard Bird Count (February 14-17) promises to add important new information to our understanding of birds' movement and overall health by focusing our attention on common birds as well as on birds of special concern.

Once again, the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and the National Audubon Society call on birders of every age and skill level to make the count possible. "We need every birder to join us," said Audubon Senior Vice President of Science Frank Gill. "The Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) has become a vitally important means of gathering data to help birds, but it can't happen unless people take part. Whether you're a novice or an expert, we need you to take part and help us help birds."

A project of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology and Audubon, with sponsorship from Wild Birds Unlimited, the GBBC combines high-tech Web tools with an army of citizen-scientist bird observers. The GBBC asks families, individuals, classrooms, and community groups to count the numbers and kinds of birds that visit their feeders, local parks, schoolyards, and other areas during any or all of the four count days. Participants enter their sightings at BirdSource, www.birdsource.org/gbbc. The state-of-the-art web site was developed by Audubon and the Cornell Lab.

Begun in 1998, the GBBC has engaged more than a quarter of a million Americans of all ages and backgrounds and united them in the effort to keep common birds common. "When the last **Ivory-billed Woodpecker** was seen in the 1930s, there was no concrete way for citizens to help professional ornithologists monitor bird populations," says Cornell

Lab of Ornithology director John Fitzpatrick, who this past year led an expedition hoping to rediscover one of North America's most spectacular birds. "We cannot allow other species to face the same fate as the ivory-bill. The Great Backyard Bird Count provides a way for citizens to help us determine which birds are where and in what numbers, so we can take steps to protect those that need protecting."

Too many species are already showing population declines. GBBC 2003 will put the spotlight on birds that appear on Audubon's WatchList, an accounting of bird species in decline or at conservation risk due to dwindling habitat and other threats. "The WatchList is an early-warning system designed to raise awareness of birds in trouble, before they become endangered or threatened," says Audubon's Gill. "Think of the WatchList as preventative medicine."

Audubon and the Cornell Lab are asking participants to pay special attention to the nearly 200 species of birds on the WatchList, which was updated in October of 2002. The site includes features relating to these birds and what participants can do to help them.

The GBBC is also important for more common species. In 2002, more than 47,000 participants counted millions of birds throughout North America. They helped the Cornell Lab and Audubon researchers make interesting observations. **Evening Grosbeaks**, plentiful in California in 2001, were nearly absent in 2002. **Snowy Owls**, magnificent hunters found predominantly in the northern part of the continent, were reported in 20 states and provinces during the 2002 count, including sightings from as far south as Oklahoma, Colorado, and Virginia. Last year's count was again instrumental in helping track winter finches, such as **Common Redpolls**, **Pine Grosbeaks**, and **White-winged Crossbills**, that periodically shift their winter ranges southward, particularly in the Northeast.

For the last four years, GBBC participants have shown that **Eurasian Collared-Doves** are also "on the go," backing results from other studies such as the Cornell Lab's Project FeederWatch. Since their introduction into Florida in the 1980s, the birds have increased in number in that state and have steadily expanded their range in the U.S. They were reported in 21 states during the 2002 count. GBBC 2003 participants will continue to help scientists keep track of the consequences of this movement.

To view these results, beginners and experts alike are invited to visit the web site. There they will also find a vocabulary section, bird-watching and bird-feeding tips, bird vocalizations, and more, including information about

House Finch eye disease and the Cornell Lab's groundbreaking study involving citizen scientists. Educators will find the bibliography and geography sections especially handy, and will also find suggestions on how to conduct the count with groups of kids. For those tired of winter and ready for spring, there will be tips about planning and preparing for the spring bird garden.

"The Great Backyard Bird Count is a terrific way individuals, families, schools, and community groups to contribute to a better understanding of birds," says the Cornell Lab's Fitzpatrick. "In return, they learn more about birds in the process. I can't think of a more enjoyable and more rewarding way to spend a little time on a late-winter day."

Instructions for participating can be found at www.birdsource.org. There is no fee or registration. Those who would like to participate but aren't online can try their local library. Many Wild Birds Unlimited locations also accept reports. 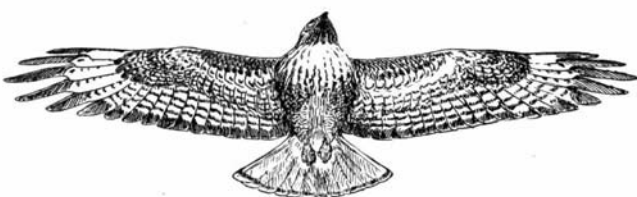

FOUR HUMMINGBIRDS SPECIES

This morning, December 4, 2002, I identified one of my yard's "phantoms" as a female Rufous/Allen's. This makes four hummingbird species presently using my yard. I may seem redundant in my reveling in this but it is a truly amazing situation. I am not on the Gulf Coast but 250 miles north of it. Prior to HUMNET, the publishing of *Hummingbird Gardens* and the resulting dissemination of information on this winter garden hummingbird phenomena, Shreveport had only scattered, single records of hummingbirds in winter. We had no certain record for Black-chinned or Broad-tailed and only one certain Rufous record. Single birds identified to genus only had been recorded in about 10 winters over the past 60 years but sporadically so, with no single bird known to have stayed all winter long. I suppose that our trend mirrors that of the Gulf Coast but with lesser diversity and a lower numbers of birds. In any case, I am astounded by the fact that I have at least four winter resident birds now of four different species.

My excitement over having four species in my Shreveport yard went up another level two days later when I caught the recently arrived Rufous and found that it was previously banded! Fred Bassett banded this adult female near Mobile Bay last January. I visited with Fred today and found that his data for her were very similar to mine. He will be looking for her to show up back on the Alabama Gulf Coast in a few weeks! She now has an orange painted crown to go with her band. She was healthy and so tolerant of the capture process that she went back in the trap and fed at the feeder inside within minutes of being released. Obviously she was hungry as well. Though her gorget pattern looks just like the Rufous that I had last year, the banding date proves that it is not the same bird.

This morning I found the Broad-tailed, the Black-chinned and maybe the Rufous but I couldn't see for sure. Plastic tarps are preserving about half of my plants but I can't keep that up for ever. I have winter plants in bloom including *S. iodantha*, *S. disjuncta*, *S. puberula* and a supposed hybrid *S. puberula* x *karwinskii*, winter shrimp, two variations on giant Turks Cap, and of course lots of fall blooming salvias still holding blooms. I wonder how much nectar is being produced though. The winter hummingbird phenomena just keeps racing forward even here, 250 miles from the Gulf Coast. How do these birds find our gardens? The whole situation just leaves me in awe.

For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used both for 1 specimen and for numbers not reported by the observer. All bird records reported here are the responsibility of the observer. The Bird Study Group is reporting observations on the word of the observers.

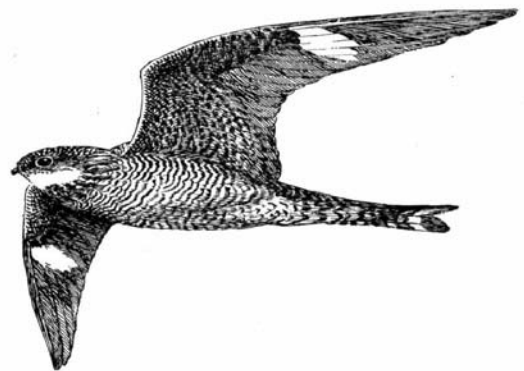
