Meet at the LSUS Museum of Life Sciences at 7:00 a.m. Saturday morning. We will head east to Monroe, where we will join Northeast Louisiana Bird Club member, Joan Brown. Joan will lead us on tours of Mollicy Farms, located near Bastrop, Louisiana, and Black Bayou NWR near Monroe on Saturday. We'll have dinner in Monroe, then head to Delhi where we'll spend the night at the Best Western. On Sunday we'll tour the Tensas River National Wildlife Refuge near Talullah.

Mollicy Farms borders the Ouachita River. This land was farmed for soybeans in the 60's and part of it is still farmed. Many of the fields have been replanted in

trees in order to restore the land to bottomland hardwoods, while some have been left empty for waterfowl. The owners built a levee along the river because the area floods easily. The levee has broken in the past and if it should break again, the plan is to let it go. There are usually large populations of waterfowl, along with Bald and Golden Eagle. There have been Short-Eared Owls in the past, although none have been sighted so far this year. Joan says there are more **Northern Harriers** there than she's seen anywhere else. Since the two species often go hand in hand, we may get lucky. We will do as much car birding as possible, but this is dependent on road condition, so there will probably be some walking. We will tailor the trip to the group, but if you're interested in sparrows, the walking could be intense. The fields are sometimes muddy and wet; so bring rubber boots if you plan to walk. Bring your scope if you have one.

Black Bayou National Wildlife Refuge is the newest in the North Louisiana Refuge Complex. Black Bayou Lake is the backup water supply for the city of Monroe. The city owns the land and has leased it to Fish and Wildlife for 99 years. The refuge has bought additional land surrounding the lake. An old planter's house was restored for use as a visitor and educational center. There are some great exhibits there. (Restrooms too!) There is a boardwalk near the house and near the boardwalk is a pier that extends out into the lake. On another part of the lake is a deck with a spotting scope. An arboretum has been planted with native trees. We may find sparrows in the wildflower meadow. Joan tells me that the trails on Black Bayou could be walked in your 'Sunday best.'

The Tensas River National Wildlife Refuge was established in 1980 in an effort to preserve the largest privately owned bottomland hardwood tract in the Mississippi Delta. U.S. Fish and Wildlife plans to acquire more land as funding permits and someday the refuge may encompass more than 85,000 acres. The refuge includes the area once known as the Singer Tract, one of the last strongholds of the Ivory-billed Woodpecker in Louisiana. The last known recording of an Ivory-billed was made here in the 1940's by Dr. James Tanner. Today the Tensas is known for its large populations of **Barred** Owl, a remnant population of the threatened Louisiana Black Bear, and other bottomland inhabitants. There is a visitor center with life-size exhibits and restrooms. A boardwalk, observation tower, and walking trails are nearby.

Please contact me in advance to sign up for the trip. Due to the proximity of Monroe (two hours) and Delhi (three hours or less) to Shreveport, participants who can't join us for both days are welcome to meet us for either Saturday or Sunday. Let me know your plans when you sign up.

What to bring: Binoculars, scope, rubber boots, mosquito repellent, picnic lunches for Saturday and Sunday. Please make your own reservations at the Best Western Delhi Inn. You may call Best Western reservations at 1-800-780-7234 or the motel directly at 318-878-5126. Rooms range from one double bed to king suites and are available for \$40.50 to \$55 plus tax per night at this website.

SOME LAST WORDS ON THE BIG SIT! 2002

he results have been tabulated for the Big Sit of and are now online at http:// members.aol.com/nhbirdclub/bigsit.htm. The data is in the form of a species list with a list of states and foreign countries where each species was sighted. As you know, for the second year in a row, BSG'ers sat at C. Bickham Dickson Park. The weather on October 13 was cold, overcast, and a strong wind was blowing out of the north. This was quite a contrast to 2001 when we sat under clear blue skies with temperatures in the 70's and our species list reflected the difference. In 2001, the Vermilion Flycatcher who wintered at the park did not make an appearance until the week after the Big Sit. In 2002, not one but two arrived the week before the Big Sit and one providentially flew within binocular distance of our circle the day of the Sit. How unique was our Vermilion Flycatcher in comparison to all reporting circles? I contacted John Triana, the compiler of TBS! 2002 (and all prior Big Sits) to find out.

John tells me that the only other circles in the U.S. to report **Vermilion Flycatcher** were three circles in Texas: Dick Heller, El Rio RV Park, Falcon Heights; Texas, Jim Sinclair, Dairy Lake, Kleberg County, Texas; and Kay Baughman, backyard, Rio Hondo, Texas. What's especially notable about these circles in relation to our circle at C. Bickham Dickson is that Falcon Heights and Rio Hondo are both in the Rio Grande Valley. Kleberg County is less than 100 miles north of "The Valley" as it is known by birders far and wide (speak in hushed tones when you say the words). Is the day too far distant when all you have to say is "CBD" to elicit the same reverent response?

John also writes, "You didn't see any species that were unique in TBS! 2002, but you did have three other birds that were only seen in two or three other circles (in the U.S.). You were one of only four circles to see **Baltimore Oriole** (Indian River Co., FL, Veracruz, Mexico, and Norfolk, VA). You were also one of four to see **Northern Waterthrush** (Key West, FL, Cape May, NJ, and Veracruz, Mexico). Finally the "rarest" bird you had was **Common Nighthawk**, which was only seen in two other circles (Conway, AR and Norfolk, VA)." Our **Northern Waterthrush**, which was heard by Charlie Lyon, was one of our circle's early birds. Charlie confirmed the identification when he found the waterthrush by one of the culverts running from the river

under the road near our Sit site. **Common Nighthawk** was the last bird of the day for our circle. Diehard sitters Jerry Bertrand, Mac Hardy, Nancy Menasco and Lily Poole sighted several of the birds flying overhead around 6:30 p.m.

Reviewing the online species lists for other fairly unique sightings for our circle, I discovered some interesting facts. Neotropic Cormorant was only seen in two other states, Arizona and Texas. We shared White **Ibis** with Florida, South Carolina, and Texas. Circles in California, Missouri, Oklahoma (including David Arbour and company at Red Slough), and Texas also saw Greater White-fronted Goose. Because of Red Slough's and C. Bickham Dickson Park's shared proximity to the Red River and that strong north wind, it's quite possible that the migrating geese David's circle saw early on were the same ones we saw later in the day. Broad-winged Hawk was also seen in Florida, Georgia, Oklahoma (Red Slough again), Texas, and Virginia. We were one of only six states to report Eastern Screech-**Owl**. Did some participants just not get up early enough?

Hanging hummingbird feeders the week before the Sit resulted in us being included in the six states reporting **Ruby-throated Hummingbird**. Thanks to a lingering **Scissor-tailed Flycatcher**, we joined the only two other states, Arkansas and Texas, which reported this species. We were one of 31 circles in the running for the **Golden Bird** award by virtue of our sighting of **Green-winged Teal**. We lost out in the random drawing to Tom Hince's circle at Holiday Beach Conservation Area in Essex County, Ontario. Tom's group donated the \$500 award to the Holiday Beach Migration Observatory.

For more statistics on TBS! 2002, check out the website listed above. If you see a species reported for Louisiana that's not on the BSG list, it's because there was one other circle in Louisiana, Van Remsen's backyard in St. Gabriel. Among others, Van added Yellow-billed Cuckoo (seen only in Louisiana, Connecticut, and Texas), Black-chinned Hummingbird (Louisiana, Arizona, New Mexico, and Texas), and Acadian Flycatcher (Louisiana and Maryland) to the state list. By the way, while you're at the website, take a look at the Captains' Notes, where you can read comments from many of the circle captains. If you want more information about which particular circles saw species, contact John Triana which itriana1@mindspring.com and he will be glad to answer any questions you have.

SPARROW STALK & OWL PROWL FIELD TRIP REPORT

leven BSG participants, seeing 53 species of birds. A cool breeze made locating small birds more difficult than usual, but we had good luck with the sparrows, finding Chipping, Savannah, Fox, Song, White-throated, three Harris's, White-Swamp, crowned, and Dark-eyed Junco. Also, the owl prowl was successful, with two Barn Owls, three Barred Owls. two Eastern Screech-Owls, and one Great-horned Owl (a bigheaded, dark shape in a tree top way in the distance). While waiting by the grassy field where many Northern Harriers had dropped down for the night, some of us heard several barks like the short bark of the Short-eared Owl, but nobody saw one or said for sure what they heard. Incidentally, Rosemary Seidler has an excellent picture of the two Barn Owls that we saw, posted on the BSG website. I always enjoy the hawks on the trip to Yearwood Road. We saw many Red-tailed Hawks, a Red-shouldered Hawk, a Cooper's Hawk, ten Northern Harriers, and a couple of American Kestrels. We also saw several Loggerhead Shrikes, which I like to include in the hawk list because they are really raptor wannabees, fierce little guys that almost rival Carolina Wrens in their grit and pluck. We were successful in leaving the area shortly after 7:00 p.m. I heard one of the trip members say that she had gained four life birds on the trip. That always makes the leader happy to know that he has helped someone gain life birds and hopefully, a greater appreciation of the world of birds.

GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT

alentine's Day is almost here and this not only means sweets for your sweetie but, for bird lovers the beginning of the Great Backyard Bird Count. Using Audubon's Watch List and the BSG data base Nancy has compiled two lists to help BSG members locate specific target birds. In last years GBBC, Northwestern Louisiana birders recorded a record high of 90 bird species making Shreveport the city with the most bird species sighted in the state of Louisiana. This year we are hoping, that with the use of the species and locator grids, BSG members will once again put Northwestern Louisiana on top. We would like members to select one of the target species and to bird its location's) in the hopes

of seeing that bird. The GBBC is February 14 though February 17. You can bird one, or all of the count days. Choose one location to bird, or several. GBBC bird lists are turned in online at www.birdsource.org/gbbc. If you are not online, turn in your bird list to Nancy (868-3255), or myself (687-2994). Remember that for the GBBC, bird sightings are reported by zip code. Be sure to report your GBBC sightings to the BSG data base as well, but also note exactly where you saw each bird on your list. If you have any questions about how to turn in your list to the BSG, call Mac Hardy at the LSUS Museum at 797-5338."

I would also like to see the GBBC used as an opportunity for members, both experienced and inexperienced, to share their field trips with other BSG members. For example, I plan to bird Cypress Black Bayou Park to locate the nesting pair of **Bald Eagles**. Anyone that would like to go birding with me to see the eagles is more than welcome to come along. If you want to share your field trip, post the date, time and meeting place on the BSG's Bird Alert server (phonetree). Those members wishing to participate should respond to that e-mail.

Another opportunity that the GBBC could provide is the comradery of birding from the comfort of your kitchen or living room window with friends. Some members are no longer comfortable going on field trips but, would welcome the pleasure of a count day and sharing their birding experience with others. Use the GBBC to invite birding friends over to your homes, or have an open house to invite new birders. Relive the joy of seeing your first **Brown-headed Nuthatch** or **Purple Finch** through the eyes and enthusiasm of a new birder. For the beginning birder that feels too inexperienced to participate, the GBBC is a great introduction to a count day. Consider the GBBC as, Count Day 101. A fun, learning experience, you won't soon forget.

One more interesting feature of the GBBC is that you can log onto their web site and see the bird species numbers come in. As far as I'm concerned these live updates are better than watching the Super Bowl. Click on Results > Maps > Select the bird species, year and region, ours is the south-central region, and watch the bird species "pileup." Do your own "dance in the end zone" when you see the **Vermilion Flycatchers**, **Spotted Towhee**, **Harris's Sparrows**, and wintering hummers have been "scored" by yet another BSG member. **Common-ground Doves! Bald Eagles!** Red-necked **Grebes!**?! Go BSG! So lets go out there and win one for the Gipper!...Ah, I mean...Oh Look! There goes a **Northern Flicker!**

SECOND ANNUAL AUDUBON COUNTRY BIRDFEST

eliciana Nature Society's Second Annual Audubon Country BirdFest will be held April 4, 5, and 6, 2003. This event is held in the scenic and historical Feliciana Parishes of Louisiana, in which John James Audubon completed many of his famous bird paintings. Visitors to this year's event are sure to have an exciting experience as they take birdwatching tours, visit historic sites, and learn about birds.

The keynote speaker of the festival is Ms. Diana Wells who published "100 Birds and How They Got Their Names" in 2000. Ms. Wells will discuss intriguing facts about the names of birds, the naturalists who named them, and even mythical stories of the gods associated with bird names. A colorful slide show accompanies this interesting discussion. Ms. Wells will speak on Friday, April 4 in St. Francisville at Hemingbough at 7:00 p.m. A dinner, live auction, silent auction, and door prizes will be a part of this festive opening night.

On Saturday, April 5, the Friends of Oakley will sponsor "An Evening with Audubon" to share interesting tales of John James Audubon's time in the Felicianas. A wine and cheese reception will accompany this presentation, which will begin at 7:00 p.m. at Jackson Hall in St. Francisville.

This year's birdwatching tours will be held on all three days of the festival. They include trips to Port Hudson State Historic Site, Cat Island National Wildlife Refuge, Tunica Hills Wildlife Management Area, Mary Ann Brown Nature Preserve, and Murrell Butler's Oakhill. Tours to Rosedown Plantation State Historic Site and Catalpa Plantation will include tours of the homes and birdwatching on the grounds of the properties. A walking tour of the town of St. Francisville will visit riparian areas along the Mississippi River. A trip to East Feliciana Parish will include a tour of Centenary State Historic Site, birdwatching along sandy Thompson Creek, and a stop at the Highlands Wine Festival. A tour to Afton Villa Gardens will be geared toward beginner bird enthusiasts. All birdwatching tours are led by experienced birdwatching guides.

Throughout the day on Saturday, April 5, Parker Memorial Park in downtown St. Francisville, will be the site for food, workshops and vendors. Seminars beginning at 10:30 a.m. will be presented to visitors. Topics include raptor rehabilitation with live birds, a discussion about how people affect birds and their environment, a slide

show of nesting birds of Louisiana, learning how to garden for birds and an opportunity to build bird houses. Additionally, a children's tent will allow kids to do bird-related crafts. The park will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. for visitors to buy lunch and crafts, bird houses, art, books and plants.

This year's feature festival bird is the Orchard Oriole. This striking black and orange bird frequents the Felicianas in spring and breeds there throughout the summer. Their nests are often made inside clumps of Spanish moss that hang from the many live oaks that dot the landscape of this area. The melodious song is heard from the treetops as they mark their territories each spring. To celebrate this bird, a poster painted by renowned local artist Murrell Butler is available to commemorate the festival.

HELP SAVE BOLIVAR FLATS

he Houston Audubon has been working several years to acquire 750 acres on the Bolivar Peninsula known as the Horseshoe Marsh. It is a beautiful saltmarsh area with exposed oyster reefs at low tide and yet also with some significant upland habitat. It serves as home for many shorebirds, **Roseate Spoonbills**, oystercatchers, **Long-billed Curlews**, **Seaside Sparrows** and meadowlarks among many others.

We are now in the final stages of completion of the project. However, due to the nature of the bankruptcies proceedings, we could not know the actual acquisition price until the last step of the process. We have received the appraisal of \$800,000. We have received a federal grant to protect the wetlands, but we still need to raise about \$300,000 as quickly as possible.

MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING

January 14, 2003, 7:00 p.m., Museum of Life Sciences at LSUS

Announcements — Mac Hardy made an announcement while waiting for Bill Wood to arrive so that Bill could introduce the speaker. Mac said that the next board meeting would be February 4, at 7:00 p.m., at the museum. At that meeting we will have a representative from the post office present to determine if the club could change the mailing of the newsletter to periodical status. Lily Poole announced that we need a new publicity chairperson for the club and asked for volunteers. Mac said that the hospitality committee needs

some help and asked for volunteers. Mac also reported that the club needs several members to help fold and mail the newsletter. He also asked for volunteers.

Christmas Count – Paul Dickson reported on the BCBCBC. He said that on this count, there were 50% more party hours than previously. Rosemary Seidler had a party of nine at Bishop Point. We saw fewer ducks and juncos than usual. He reported a huge increase in corvids, chickadees and titmice. There was also a large increase in woodpeckers. In particularly there was a doubling of Red-bellied Woodpeckers and three times as many Downy Woodpeckers. Several Gray Catbirds were seen which is typical of a warm winter. There were three new birds for the count. Jim Ingold saw a Goldencrowned Sparrow associating with White-throated Sparrows, Charlie Lyon saw a Common Ground-Dove, and Paul Dickson saw a Caspian Tern on the Red River. Caspian Terns are very uncommon in January. In all, 127 species were seen. The record number of species on this count was 134 in 2000.

Program – Bill Wood had not arrived, so Mac Hardy decided to continue with the program. Mac introduced the speaker Lynn Jackson who spoke on managing the **Red-cockaded Woodpecker** in the Kisatchie National Forest, Winn Ranger District.

Field Trips – Mac Hardy reported that Jim Ingold would take his class to see the Red-cockaded Woodpeckers on January 28 in the morning. Jim will also lead the field trip to Cheneyville to see the Sandhill Cranes. Bird banding at Paul Dickson's deer farm is scheduled for February 15, but Paul wants to change the date to February 22. However, Jim was not at the meeting to discuss the matter. Mac also reported that Jim would be banding at his eastern Texas site on January 18. Instructions on how to get there were available from Mac. Nancy Menasco reported that Hubert Hervey would lead the owl prowl on Yearwood Road. She said that anyone who participates would need a Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries License to be able to enter the wildlife management area. Nancy also reminded everyone that the LOS winter meeting was January 24-26. in Lake Charles.

Miscellaneous – Lilly Poole reported that we have 100 paid accounts. Mac Hardy read a letter from Will Smolenski thanking the club for the awards he received. Mac also said that the deadline for submitting bird reports was the 25th of the month. He reported that the board had approved an award for the best science fair project pertaining to birds and birding at the Regional Science Fair. Amanda Crnkovic will judge the projects and

present the award. Mac told everyone that Rosemary Seidler had been elected president of LOS.

Treasurer's Report - Jean Trahan reported that on December 31, the club had \$2,156.65 in the bank. In addition we had \$482.84 and \$472.81 in prepaid expenses at the post office and LSUS printing, respectively. The fund balance is \$3,122.80. Net income for the month of December was \$565.96.00, and there were no expenses. Jean also reported that proceeds from the Christmas party/auction were \$848.75, which was up 51% from the previous year.

Subscriptions Committee - Hubert Hervey, chair of the committee, said that his committee recommends that we drop our memberships in the North American Hawk Migration Association and the Bluebird Association. A motion was made to that effect and passed.

Bird Talk – Jeff Trahan saw a Common Ground-dove at Bickham Dickson Park. Nan Franks sought identification of a hawk she saw in her back yard. It had white and black bands on its tail. Most members thought it might be a Sharp-shinned Hawk. Linda Adrion saw a Greater Roadrunner in Lincoln Parish and wondered how far west their range extended. Nancy Menasco reported Bonaparte's Gulls, American Pipits, and Ring-billed Gulls at Bickham Dickson Park. She also reported both Vermilion Flycatchers at the park Tuesday and a Blue-headed Vireo in her backyard today.
