Meet at the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' office near the dam at 8:00 a.m. If you heard Suzanne's fascinating presentation on Bodcau at the March BSG meeting, you know you don't want to miss this trip. Bayou Bodcau is an extraordinarily beautiful area with many diverse habitats. Nesting species include **Wild Turkey, Barred Owl, White-breasted Nuthatch, Northern Parula, Yellow-throated Warbler, Prothonotary Warbler**, and possibly **Swainson's Warbler** and **American Kestrel**. Our field trip will include areas of the WMA not open to the general public. Bring a picnic lunch and a folding chair.

Directions: From Shreveport or Bossier City, go east on I-20. At I-20 Exit 33, go left (north) on LA 157 a little less than 8 miles to Bellevue. At Bellevue, turn right on Bodcau Dam Road. Follow Bodcau Dam Road; it will go through the WMA Recreation Areas and across the spillway. The Corps office is located on the road that leads to your left on the far side of the dam. You can see the office and the Durden House from the Bodcau Dam Road. The trip takes about 45 minutes from southeastern Shreveport. We will bird in the area around the office for awhile so that we don't leave anyone behind.

Toledo Bend Field Trip

The April 16th field trip participants met at Pat and I's home for a trip to the Toledo Bend country of DeSoto Parish. While birding around the house, a beautiful banded **Harris' Sparrow** flew to feed on the seeds at the table. Two or more of these sparrows have been present since late November. Several **American Goldfinch** were present in their finest yellow plumage. A half-dozen male **Indigo Bunting** perched in the sun along a nearby fence. We found only **Blue-gray Gnatcatcher** and **Red-eyed Vireo** feeding in the pecan orchard. Apparently the nearly perfect weather encouraged the hoped for warblers and vireos to pass by during the night. We were soon to combine birding with a history lesson!

We made several woodland stops adding; **Parula, Swainson's, Hooded, Black-throated Green, and Yellow-throated Warblers**. Some of these birds plus a **Yellow-breasted Chat** were present at the burial site of

Moses Rose, in a remote cemetery on the Funston Road, northeast of Logansport. I told the story of Moses Rose as the monument states, he was a "Soldier of the Alamo." How can a man who fought at the Alamo be buried hundreds of miles from that place, when all others died in the battle? Because the sign is being politically correct, he is better known as "The Coward of the Alamo." He was the one man who did not step across the line in the sand drawn by Colonel Travis. He was a European Soldier of Fortune, fought in the French Revolution, and did not feel it was important for him to sacrifice his life for Texas in a fight to the death with Mexico. His multilingual ability undoubtedly helped him pass through the Mexican lines at night, but his sandals failed him. He was crippled by cactus thorns as he made his way east away from the forces of Santa Anna.

He spent many months recovering with a Doctor friend in Center, Texas. When his health improved enough he came to Logansport, Louisiana to work on the docks. He finished his life on the farm of Mr. Ferguson, and was buried there when he died. Due to fear of vandalism the only markers on the grave for over a century were Yucca (Spanish Dagger). These plants endured and through folklore and word of mouth, the burial site was known and is now marked for all to see. A concrete path leads past coral honeysuckle and a woodsman of the world monument to a granite marker at the last resting place of this soldier of fortune.

After the history lesson the birding trip went to Logansport for a picnic lunch as we watched **Cliff** and **Barn Swallows** building nests under the bridge over the Sabine River. We finished the trip on the northern part of Toledo Bend Lake where 382 **American White Pelicans** were resting in scattered flocks. A pair of **Red-headed Woodpecker**, and a lone **Gray Catbird** at Oak Ridge Park left us feeling good about the 85 species we had seen along the way.

Red River National Wildlife Refuge

On Saturday, March 19, 2005, Brett Hunter, refuge manager, led a group of Bird Study Group members on tours of two units of the Red River National Wildlife Refuge (NWR). We first visited the refuge's headquarters unit, which borders the Red River just south of the Jimmie Davis Bridge in Bossier Parish. Habitat includes riparian areas, an old pecan orchard, woods, open fields, and a small lake. The open fields provide excellent sparrow habitat; indeed, **Field Sparrows** were singing from the bare branches of very small trees during our visit. Early wildflowers were

blooming and small plum trees (variety unknown) dotted the fields here and there. Buntings and **Dickcissels** should find this area to their liking in summer.

The wooded site of the future headquarters' building, to be constructed when the necessary funds are appropriated by Congress, overlooks the lake. On the lake were several species of duck and **Pied-billed Grebe** while the woods held **Brown Thrasher**, **Blue-gray Gnatcatcher**, several species of woodpecker, including **Yellow-bellied Sapsucker** and **Pileated Woodpecker**, and other typical species.

This unit holds much promise for the community as an easily-accessible urban refuge, similar to that of Black Bayou NWR in Monroe. As commercial and residential development expands, fewer and fewer natural areas such as this remain, especially in such close proximity to our cities. In fact, at present the only entrance to the headquarters unit of the Red River NWR is through a housing subdivision. The unit is expected to be opened to the public once the boundary lines are marked and the appropriate signage put up.

We next visited the refuge's Bayou Pierre unit in Red River Parish south of Westdale. Although there are sections of the unit on both sides of LA 1, the only section open to the public at this time is the area bordered by the Red River to the east, LA 1 to the west, and PR 403 to the south. The northwestern corner of this section is where LA 509 comes into LA 1. A large area of this unit, which was planted in rice until recently, is being managed as a moist soil impoundment for use by wintering waterfowl, wading birds, and migrating shorebirds. Because these are rice fields, pumps are already in place to allow control of the water level. When feasible, probably in the next couple of years, the fields will once again be planted in rice. An adjoining area has been planted in mixed hardwoods such as once grew here. This unit also includes a small pond and access to the riparian area along the river.

Access to this unit is on foot because of the potential damage to the dirt roads and levees from extended use by vehicular traffic. ATV's are allowed on designated trails from September 1 through February 28. You will find a place to park a short distance down PR 403 next to some open sheds. For our tour, we all piled into Brett's truck. Several hundred ducks, including **Gadwall**, **Mallard**, **Northern Shoveler**, **Green-winged Teal**, and **Ruddy Duck**, foraged in the middle of the wet fields, while **Greater Yellowlegs**, **Least Sandpiper**, and at least 45 **Wilson's Snipe** were found in the part of the field closer to LA 1.

We are fortunate to have in Brett Hunter a refuge manager who is knowledgeable and committed. Brett's first priority for the Red River Wildlife Refuge in terms

of public outreach is educating children and providing them with the experiences which foster a love and appreciation for the natural world. A Friends of the Refuge group is being formed. Brett has told us that a refuge with a Friends group is looked upon in a more favorable light when it comes to funding and the like. Cross Lake Shore Birding

On a fine morning in early April, Silviera Hunt, Rosemary Seidler, Jerry Bertrand, and I birded Richard Fleming Park and the West Lakeshore area, searching for early migrants. Our search did not go unrewarded as we ended the morning with over 60 species. At Richard Fleming Park, we first birded the spit of land or peninsula that extends along Fordney Bayou. **White-eyed Vireos** and **Yellow-throated Warblers** were singing, **Blue-gray Gnatcatchers** flitted around, and **Yellow-rumped Warblers** were very much in evidence. Rosemary and Silviera saw a **Warbling Vireo** and I found a **Common Yellowthroat** skulking in the undergrowth. A first of spring **Blue Grosbeak** and an **Indigo Bunting** also made appearances. **Tufted Titmice** and their frequent companions, **Carolina Chickadees**, were plentiful, along with always-beautiful, but sometimes-taken-for-granted **Northern Cardinals**. Elsewhere in the park, **Pine Warblers** were heard and four **Red-headed Woodpeckers** glided between perches on trees and light posts.

As we left the park, we turned left to follow West Lakeshore to its dead end in a swamp-like area of the lake. We heard **Northern Parulas** trilling but could never locate one. A **Red-eyed Vireo** and a **Blue-headed Vireo** were more cooperative although we got vireo-neck (similar if not exactly like warbler-neck) watching them forage near the tops of very tall trees. A **Yellow-throated Warbler** gave brief looks at the top of another very tall tree. Besides being a very bird spot, there is no traffic here so it's quite easy to bird from the road with no fears of being run over. At our last stop on West Lakeshore, a **Hooded Warbler** we had been hearing for some time finally revealed himself very close to the road.

We parted company at that point, but Rosemary called to tell us that she and Silviera had counted 96 **Snowy Egrets** and 37 **Little Blue Herons** in a rookery at the I-220 exit on Shreveport-Blanchard Highway. Later on Jerry and I stopped by the rookery and watched some of the nest-building activity. A beautiful spring day with four species of vireo and enough warblers to keep us happy ending with a visit to a rookery, it was a great day to be outdoors!

The First Book of Birds by Olive Thorne Miller (Houghton Mifflin Company, The Riverside Press, Cambridge, MA, 1899)

A Book Review: Part Three by Hubert Hervey

My sister discovered this book, *The First Book of Birds* (published in 1899), while going through some of the items in the estate of her mother-in-law. It is a "book intended to interest young people in the ways and habits of birds, and to stimulate them to further study." I found it quite interesting, and wished I could share some of the author's thoughts with members of the Bird Study Group. The prosaic style of writing and the simplistic acceptance of the ways of our friends in the bird world might seem quaint to the advanced scientific thought processes of our day, and yet I feel that over a century ago they had something we have lost in our world. There are eight full-page color pictures of birds, and nine full-page black-and-white pictures in the 144 total pages from which I have extracted the following tidbits. I can't explain it well, but if you will read with a slower pace than usual, so that you may absorb more of the intent of the writer, maybe you can tell me what I am feeling. The best way I know to convey the author's meaning is to quote a bit from each chapter. I hope you get a feeling for the early era of ornithology, as the story of birds, studied in the late 1800's, unfolds.

Reviewer's note: The following excerpt has been taken exactly from the original source, with only an occasional change in word arrangement to facilitate the meaning in the original. Any errors are copied as originally written with no editorial effort, in order to retain the essence intended by the author. Section titles are printed in bold; chapters are printed in italics.

HOW HE IS MADE. *His body.* If we should try to go through the air as fast as a bird goes, we should find it very hard to breathe. But the bird is made for it. He can sing while he is working very hard to fly upward. If you will try to sing while running up a hill, you will see how hard it is to do that. Birds have no teeth, yet they eat hard seeds, like acorns and grains of corn. To break

these up, and get them ready for the stomach, they have a gizzard, which is a sort of grinding-mill. And to help in the work of grinding they swallow small stones.

His beak and tongue. The beak is the only thing most birds have in place of a hand. Orioles use it as a needle, in making the nest. With it they weave strips of soft bark, back and forth, in and out, to make the firm pocket they hang on the elm-tree. The woodcock's long beak is sensitive, so that he can feel the worms, deep in the mud where they live. Many waders and swimmers have beaks soft like leather. A woodpecker has barbs on his tongue, to spear insects hidden under the bark. It is also sticky, to hold small insects like ants.

His eyes and ears. Birds' eyes are placed one on each side of the head, so that they can look two ways at once. Owls are the only birds who have eyes turned forward like ours. Birds' eyes also are of many colors. Besides our common black, brown, blue, and gray, birds have light and dark green, bright red, pale and deep yellow and orange, even white. They have, like us, two eyelids. But while we use the upper one to close our eyes, most birds use the lower one. They have also a third eyelid, inside the others, a thin, white sort of skin, that moves across the eye from side to side, and is called the "nictitating membrane."

His feet and legs. On looking carefully at one of these bare legs, it will be seen that it is not smooth like a lead pencil. It is marked in a sort of pattern. Different species of birds show different patterns. Some look like the shingles on a roof; others like little squares or plates and some are finer like scales on a tiny fish. These marks help in arranging birds in the books. That is, all who have the same pattern are said to be related.

His wings and tail. A birds' wing is a wonderful flying-machine, which men have been trying to imitate these many years. (reviewers note - Orville and Wilbur Wright developed a successful glider with sidewise balance control in 1902, and successfully flew a powered airplane at Kittyhawk, NC in 1903). It is made of long stiff feathers, which fold down smoothly over one another at his side when he is resting, but can spread in an instant into a broad fan, to beat the air and carry him away. Birds wings may be used as a strong weapon to defend themselves or to fight others. Sometimes wings serve as musical instruments. Woodcocks make whistling sounds with their wings as they fly. Ruffed grouse produce with theirs a rolling drum-like effect. The tail is formed of an equal number of feathers in pairs, most often twelve. The tail is used more than any other organ to express the emotions. Some birds, like the catbird and thrasher, keep it moving nearly all the time, jerking it this way and that, and tossing it upward.

His dress. No one takes better care of his dress than a bird, and that is why it looks well for a year. Every day, with most birds, it is washed and carefully dried, each feather being passed through the bill, and the whole thoroughly shaken out. At night one may often see robins and catbirds before going to bed, dressing their plumage and shaking off the day's dust. Besides washing and drying the feathers, birds need oil to keep them in best condition. For this purpose they have a little "oil jug," a small gland over the tail, out of which, with the bill they can squeeze a drop of oil.

Different colored suits. A Goldfinch through the summer wears a gay yellow coat, comes out in the fall in plain olive and black; and the scarlet tanager, who flourishes in the most brilliant red, changes to a quiet green in winter. Most of them change by moulting. But some change color without moulting, but partly by fading, and partly by breaking off the tips of the feathers, or what is called "abrasion." While the feathers are new and perfect, they lie over each other like shingles on a roof, only the edges show, and these can change completely as a yellow tip breaks off and reveals the black color of the rest of the feather. The yellow bird suddenly becomes a black bird."

Larry Raymond recently spotted a **Nashville Warbler** in Walter B. Jacobs Nature Park. Jim Ingold reports a **Summer Tanager** on the LSUS campus today.

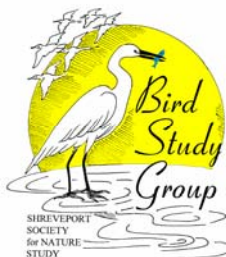

BIRD REPORT – *compiled May 1, 2005*

Use the bird report to see what other birders have been seeing and where to go find the bird you want to see. Observers are abbreviated by the first and last initials. Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer's initials. Sightings are arranged by species. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of the observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds they observed, etc. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used for both 1 bird and for numbers not reported by the observer. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.

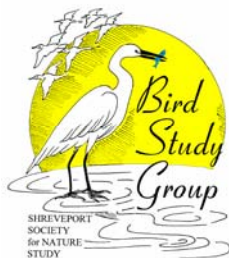
