MINUTES of the LAST MEETING

The regular monthly meeting of the SSNS Bird Study Group was held Tuesday, 9 April 1991, in Room 229 of the Science Building on the LSUS campus. The meeting was called to order at 7:11 P.M. by President Will Smolenski. Will asked new members and guests to stand and be recognized.

Will asked for additions or corrections to the minutes in the April newsletter. There being none, the minutes were accepted as recorded.

Betty Mason reported a previous balance in the treasury of \$1,571.06. We had income this month of \$165.00 and expenses of \$200.00 to the post office, leaving an April balance of \$1,536.06.

Will announced that the election for new board members will be held next month. Mac

Hardy is taking nominations and will be calling people and asking them to serve.

The "Big Day" field trip will be held on Saturday, May 11, at Loggy Bayou Plantation. Paul Dickson hopes to provide crawfish from his ponds, but will need to buy them if he does not have any. A motion was made and approved allowing Paul to buy the crawfish, if necessary, with Bird Study Group funds. A discussion followed concerning other food that needs to be brought to the event. Members present signed up to bring new potatoes, corn, sausage, and dessert. The Bird Study Group will provide drinks.

June field trips will include a trip to the Kisatchie National Forest to see Red-cockaded woodpeckers, and a visit to the Cattle egret rookery on Cross Lake. Dates for these trips will be published in the next newsletter.

Will reported that we now have 140 paid members.

Will noted that Mac has requested help stapling and folding the newsletter for mailing. Ed Bitowski volunteered to help with this activity.

Will noted that Steve Cole has been added to the phone tree under Jim McCain.

A birding hotspot map showing eleven birding spots was displayed at the meeting. Will reported that Larry Raymond plans to purchase colored maps of Caddo and Bossier parishes to display in the future. Will also stated that more information concerning the birds found in Bodcau Wildlife Management Area is needed. It is hoped that a booklet on these birding hotspots will eventually be available.

Will asked members to report bird sightings to Connie Connors, especially rare birds observed. Also, the phone tree should be called for rare birds.

Will reported that the board voted to recommend to the membership that he be allowed to spend up to \$200.00 to purchase materials to make a bookcase for the Museum. The bookcase will be used for books in the Bird Study Group library. A motion approving this expenditure was made and passed.

Will noted that April is Earth Month. The Bird Study Group will man a table at the Earth Day Mall from 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. on Sunday, April 21. A list was passed around for members to sign to work one-hour shifts during this time. Four workers per shift are needed - two to man the table and two to help Mac in the Museum.

Other Earth Month events include a program at the Strand Theater by Jean-Michel Cousteau at 8:00 P.M. on April 14, a lecture by Ducks Unlimited in the LSUS University Center Theater at 7:00 P.M. on April 15, a lecture by Greenpeace in the LSUS University Center Theater at 7:00 P.M. on April 16, a program by the Delta Chapter of the Sierra Club at LSUS at 7:00 P.M. on April 17, and a presentation by Earth First at LSUS at 7:00 P.M. on April 18.

Will drew numbers for door prizes. Both Gladden and Helen Hood won books on prehistoric animals. Our guest speaker, Dr. Cecil Kirsting, won a Dinosaur calendar, and a guest visitor, John Ostrander, won a birdhouse. Gladden gave his book to Velda Neilson to give to her children.

Charles Lyon introduced our guest speaker, Dr. Cecil Kirsting. Dr. Kirsting, who is retired, travels extensively studying birds. He presented a very informative program illustrated with beautiful photography on "Birds of the Antarctic."

Mac announced that a videotape of the Inca doves in Oil City will be available for viewing in the Museum on the afternoons of April 12 and April 19.

The meeting adjourned at 8:50 P.M.

MINUTES OF THE BOARD MEETING

The Board met on Tuesday, April 5, 1991, at the home of Ed and Shirley Huss. Board members present were Mac Hardy, Shirley Huss, Velda Neilson, Larry Raymond, Dick Rolandt, Rosemary Seidler, and Will Smolenski. President Will Smolenski called the meeting to order at 7:15 P.M.

Will asked for a motion to approve the

minutes as recorded in the March newsletter. The motion was made, seconded, and approved.

Will reported an April balance in the treasury of \$1,736.06, and a balance in the post office account of \$50.89. He noted that Betty Mason plans to transfer \$200.00 to the post office account.

The board discussed the upcoming elections of new board members in May. Five board positions will be vacant and need to be filled. Seven new names were suggested by board members present, and three of the board members vacating their positions could be asked to serve again if needed. The potential nominees will be contacted to determine if they would be willing to serve. A slate of nominees will be presented at the general meeting in May.

Will announced that Dr. Cecil Kirsting of New Orleans will present the April program on "Birding in Antarctica." Dr. Jim Ingold will present a program on cranes in May.

The next field trip will be Saturday, April 6, at the Bickham Dickson Park. Participants will meet at the horse barn at 8:30 A.M. Jim McCain will lead this trip.

The date for the annual Big Day at Loggy Bayou Plantation has not been set. A firm date will be given at the general meeting, April 9. In June, a Kisatchie outing to see Red-cockaded woodpeckers is planned. Also, another outing to see the Cattle egret rookery is planned for June.

Shirley reported a current membership of 140.

Mac requested more articles for the newsletter. News items and articles related to birds are needed and will be accepted any time. Mac also noted that more help is needed to staple and label the newsletter. Pat Lonnecker has been doing this job in addition to preparing the newsletter for bulk mailing.

Velda asked that she be advised of door prizes to be given away at the meetings in order to prepare numbers to be drawn.

Will reported that the Eagle Quilt generated about \$230.00 for the treasury.

Dick noted that Steve Cole has been added to the phone tree under Jim McCain's name. His office number is 687-7212, and his home number is 861-4317.

Larry showed a map of "Birding Hotspots" for Caddo and Bossier parishes. He noted that the map was for information and to solicit more input from the membership about the eleven birding spots indicated. The board discussed possible formats for the birding guide. A motion was made and approved to allow Larry to spend up to \$50.00 to purchase maps for use in the guide.

Mac reported that a few things still need to be moved into the Museum, but progress is being made.

Will reported that he has an inventory of items available for sale in the gift shop. He noted that more field guides need to be ordered. The board approved ordering more guides of several kinds to sell. Will also stated that he would like to build a bookshelf for the Museum to use for the Bird Group library. A motion was made and approved to recommend to the membership that Will be allowed to spend up to \$200.00 for materials for the shelf.

The board discussed the purchases of more books for the Bird Group library. Several books already approved for purchase have still not been bought. Will stated that he will ask Ed Bitowski to follow-up on this item.

Will reported that he has received another \$25.00 donation from Ruth H. Noel in memory of Vera Lee Grubbs.

Mac reported that he and Jim Ingold saw five Inca Doves at one time on the ground in Oil City this afternoon.

Under old business, the board discussed the Earth Day Mall to be held at LSUS from 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. on Sunday, April 21. The Bird Group needs to contact Sylvia Cotton with the Girl Scout Office if we want a booth. It was decided that we should have a booth and divide the afternoon into one-hour shifts. Will plans to try and get four people to work each one-hour shift - two for the booth, and two to help Mac in the Museum.

The next board meeting will be held on Tuesday, June 4, at Will Smolenski's house. Election of officers will take place at this meeting.

The board meeting adjourned at 8:52 P.M.

FIELD TRIPS

June 1, 7:30 AM. Meet in the parking lot next to the Museum to car-pool to the Kisatchie National Forest, especially to find Red-cockaded Woodpeckers. Charlie Lyon will be the leader. Bring food and drink; an ice chest will be available.

BIG DAY OF BIRDING

The Big Day of birding for the Bird Study Group each year is the delightful trip to Loggy Bayou Plantation. Due to the kind hospitality of Paul Dickson we gather each May at this serene locality to search out and count as many species of birds as is humanly possible in one day (taking out adequate time for feasting and visiting).

Saturday, May 11, is the date for this year. We will have more details at the May meeting. Crayfish will be provided and other items will be brought by volunteers. A food list (new potatoes, corn, sausage, bread, chips, dip, etc.) is being circulated; call Will (865-2938) to add your name and item to the food list. See the map for directions. It is about a one-hour drive from Shreveport. Some will car-pool from the Museum. Birding will start at daylight.

Directions: Follow U. S. 71 south from the 70th Street (Jimmy Davis) bridge about 16 1/2 miles to the boundary between Bossier Parish and Bienville Parish (this is just on the south side of the raised bridge over Loggy Bayou). Turn left (east) on La. hwy. 4 and go about 4.4 miles to the entrance on the left to Loggy Bayou Plantation. Proceed to the house (approximately 2 miles).

April 25, 1991

Report bird records for the Newsletter to Connie Connors (865-6422) by the 25th of each month. Only records not printed since the last Newsletter are published.

Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of observer, number of birds observed; initials of another observer, number of birds observed; etc.). For example: 15 PD 3; BW 1,5) means that on the fifteenth PD saw 3 birds, BW saw 1 at one locality and 5 at another. For the number of birds observed, a one is used both for one specimen or for numbers not reported by the observer. Two (or more) numbers following an observer are numbers of birds seen at two (or more) different localities. The month is abbreviated only if it is the month preceding the one being reported.

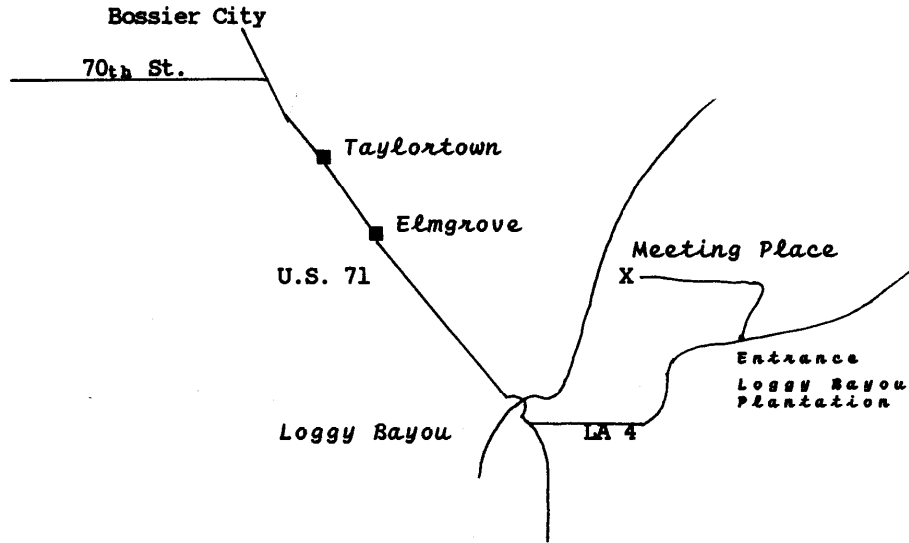
