This will be a good time to sharpen our skills at shorebird identification. Refreshments will be available and birds will be the main topic of discussion. Hope to see you there.

PRESIDENT'S THOUGHTS

Having just returned from the fall LOS meeting in Cameron, Louisiana, I find I have my usual reluctance to return to "real" space and time. We are very fortunate to have an area where it is possible to become completely immersed in the birding activities of the moment and the enjoyment of an environment so rich and distinctly different from our lovely north Louisiana hills. I am always reluctant to leave and eager to return.

At the LOS meeting over 200 species of birds were recorded. As usual, several rarities were documented. I saw my first Burrowing Owl and Clay-colored Sparrow as we walked the grassy areas of Rutherford Beach, where we also saw Grasshopper Sparrow, Black-shouldered Kite, and Parula Warbler. Farther west at Broussard Beach we saw Piping Plovers and Snowy Plovers. Continuing along the Gulf shore to Cameron Beach we saw Reddish Egret, Brown Pelican, American White Pelican, and untold thousands of gulls and terns.

The LOS is to be commended for initiating a new policy that can add to our enjoyment of this area; tour groups

led by various experts with experience in Cameron Parish. Our group was led by the indefatigable Roger Breedlove. Roger has that indispensable quality advantageous for a good tour leader, a desire to find and share the best birds possible with all those in the group regardless of their birding proficiency. Surprisingly, the birds were scarce in the wooded areas and we had to work hard, walking a lot for all of our best birds. We found them in the small thorn bush clumps on higher ground between the beaches and the marshes. Thank you Charlie Lyon and Co. for increasing our enjoyment and knowledge of the area. SUPPORT RECYCLING

COWBIRDS SHINING IN THE SUN

On Sunday, 25 October 1992, we set out attempting to see some of the uncommon birds that had been seen by the experts on Saturday during the Cameron LOS day. We easily saw the Buff-bellied Hummingbird a block or so west of Marianna Tanner's home in Cameron. We tried for Red Knot near West Jetty but there were just too many birds, too much heat shimmer, and a bad sun angle. With not much doing in the woods at Holleyman Sanctuary we decided to look for the reported Shiny Cowbird, a recent and unwelcome addition to the Louisiana bird list. We located a male bird (two I think) across the highway from Holleymans. Often he would disappear in the tall grass around the oil and gas compressor station fence. Then again he would perch on the cyclone fence obligingly in the company of Brown-headed Cowbirds, Red-winged Blackbirds, and Cassidix sp. I quickly noted the green sheen to the wings, the dark eye (not red as in Bronzed Cowbird), and smaller, sleeker, head-neck line (not ruffed as in the Bronzed Cowbird). A bird larger than a Brown-headed Cowbird with a longer more pointed bill; this was definitely a Shiny Cowbird; the fourth addition to my life list during this great three-day trip. Soon other birders started appearing seemingly out of nowhere and the inevitable discussion started, but I think everyone was convinced eventually that we were actually seeing Shining Cowbirds shining in the sun. -- Hubert Hervey

WHOOPS!

On the day prior to leaving for Cameron I was lucky enough to talk with a friend who knew the rice country and where combines were likely to be operating in second crop rice. Randy Laverne, manager of the rice drier at Thornwell, Louisiana, said he would have two operators combining rice Friday, October 23, 1992. Five of us set out early with high but guarded hopes of finding a Yellow Rail. South of Welsh, Louisiana, we ran into Charlie Lyon and

his group of four, who joined us. We say many harvested rice fields but no combines operating. Upon arrival at the Farmers Grain Dryer & Storage area at Thornwell we were guided to a remote location where three combines run by Phil Watkins were harvesting second cutting rice. We were graciously permitted to ride inside the combines, two birders at a time. The rest of us watched King Rails, Virginia Rails, and Soras flush as Charlie Lyon and his daughter rode in a combine opening up a new section of rice fields. After a couple of rounds Charlie got down and reported that binoculars were unnecessary to see the rails as they flushed just ahead and beside the combines. Excitedly he reported seeing eight Yellow Rails. The Yellow Rail is easy to identify because of the trailing white wing primaries. But do not expect them to be yellow, they are actually dark when seen from above.

Then it came my turn and along with Pat Tuminello we rode the combine finishing the section Charlie had just opened up. We saw King Rails, Virginia Rails, Soras, Sedge Wrens, unknown sparrows, but no Yellow Rails. During the final lap I started to wonder if this was a lucky day or not because everything I had read concerning hunting rails in this manner indicated that the center finishing cut was the time to expect the most rails. So we stayed aboard to open up the next section. As we harvested beside the levee we saw our first Yellow Rail. Not the best of looks but satisfactory. Pat was good at seeing the little guys outrunning the combine just in front of us. Then a Yellow Rail jumped up barely in front of the combine and as Pat pointed at it, the reel reached out, plucked it out of the air and sent it through the machinery into the rice hopper. The operator, Jim Johnson, said "Whoops." I said "Yellow Rail gumbo" and "can Mac have the feathers for the Museum collection"? We also got an excellent look at eight Yellow Rails. Indeed, all nine of us saw Yellow Rails to our complete satisfaction. Will Smolenski is convinced he saw a Black Rail, the lucky guy. For further

information on seeing rails this way read the L.O.S. News, issue 131, 1 October 1989, "Yellow Rails and Rice" by Gwen Smalley, the source of my know-how and the reason for our success. Many thanks to the Thornwell personnel, and the combine owners and operators for the friendly cooperation. We will remember this outing with special delight. -- Hubert Hervey

MY GREATEST WEEKEND IN BIRDING

Starting Friday, October 23, 1992, I walked the dog at 6 AM. I heard a screech owl and saw a robin and other birds on our walk. The owl and robin were the only ones seen or heard on the 3-day trip. Hubert Hervey was the catalyst for this super weekend of birding. I met Velda and Vicki at the Mansfield exit and caravanned down to Thornwell, southeast of Lake Charles. We met Charlie Lyon on the way, who joined our caravan. Had a fantastic time birding from the air-conditioned cab of a combine. I saw King Rails, Sora, Yellow Rails, and Black Rail, the last two being life birds for me. We got to the Cameron Motel after dark and late for the LOS meeting. We had seen 75 birds with little from the I-49 ponds due to fog. I met Jim Stewart, a great birder and former Shreveporter, who joined Shirley Huss and her sister and I for dinner.

We were up early Saturday and out to the east jetty. We saw hoards of birds up close due to high tide. Terns, gulls, Roseate Spoonbills, pelicans, cormorants, herons, ibis, geese overhead, Clapper Rail, plovers, stilts, American Avocet, sandpipers, curlews, and dowitchers were seen. I probably missed a few, but its like trying to find who you know at a Saints game in the dome. From there we went to E. J. woods -- saw Eastern Phoebe, Brown Thrasher, kinglets, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, wrens, White-eyed Vireo, Indigo Bunting, warblers, and sparrows. Then to Rutherford Beach (saw Western Kingbird on the way), looking for the Palm Warbler in brush and grass along beach. We saw Clay-colored Sparrows and Grasshopper Sparrows plus others. Also saw a

Burrowing Owl, warblers, wrens, and Northern Harriers in fields just off the beach. On the beach we saw gulls, terns, Black Skimmers sandpipers, pelicans, dowitchers, curlews, American Avocets, Sanderlings, Dunlins, Willets, and plovers, including the Snowy Plover and the endangered Piping Plover. We saw 94 species Saturday counting only 1 duck. At the VFW hall we had a good meal (gumbo, chicken, beef, turkey, fish, rice, and bread pudding). All groups counted 207 species Saturday.

Up early Sunday (but with 1 hour extra sleep) and went to see hummingbirds at Mrs. Tanner's. At Mrs. Dossier's we saw a Buff-bellied Hummingbird. On the ponds on the north side of Cameron we saw many ducks that we had not seen on Saturday. We also saw Roseate Spoonbills, ibis, herons, cormorants, grebes, hawks, Common Moorhens, American Coots, stilts, yellowlegs, gulls, terns, Eastern Phoebe, swallows, grackles, blackbirds, and sparrows.

On the way to the east jetty we saw the Virginia Rail close up to complete seeing all of the species of rails found in the U.S. The tide was out so the east jetty provided very little; birds were out too far. We took the ferry to west Cameron; saw Peregrine Falcon at the water tank. At mud flat by collecting tanks we saw hoards of wading birds but Hubert could not find his Red Knot. At Holly Beach more shore birds, then on to the chenier sanctuary. Too late in day and dry conditions produced only a few species -- some warblers, kinglets, American Redstart, at a watering hole, and a few others. A short distance away we saw two Shining Cowbirds with a scope; confirmed by C. Lyon, Bill Wood, Jim Stewart, and Bruce Crider.

Worn out, tired but happy we arrived home after 8 pm. My dog was happy to see me. After a two mile walk with the dog and a hot bath I went straight to bed. I could not sleep for about two hours thinking of all the neat birds I had seen. A list of the birds will be at the next meeting. -- Will Smolenski

Bird talk included large numbers of catbirds in Cameron, 108 species (B. Wood) and many ducks on Cross Lake, including 5 Redhead, 100 Gadwall, both teal, American Widgeon and Ruddy Ducks plus an Osprey and 3 Sedge Wrens at Mallard Bay (Charlie Lyons). The group saw many birds at the Pat Sewell farm including, Barn Owl, Grey Catbirds and Rose-breasted Grosbeaks.

Pat Lonnecker gave a short program on fall warbler identification.

Dr. Charlie Viers, Natchitoches, gave the program on the distribution and spread of the Cliff Swallow in Louisiana. Based on numerous questions asked, the program was well received.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:53 and everyone partook of tasty snacks and good conversation.
