This annual count began in 1999 and is sponsored by the Lower Mississippi Valley Joint Venture Shorebird Monitoring Program. The objective of the Joint Venture is to ensure that adequate habitat for migrating shorebirds is provided on managed public lands as a safety net during years when habitat conditions outside

of public lands are poor. The count is designed to provide two types of data: "Reliable estimates of shorebird numbers across the entire region at intervals in migration" and "estimates of turnover rates (how long are birds staying at a particular site)." To this end, you are asked to count during fall migration on designated weekends in August and September. You may count wherever you like for as long as you like. Enter your observations directly into the database at www.lmvjv.org/shorebird. Visit the website to learn more about the program and to register. Remember to report your observations to the BSG database as well.

North American Migration Count 2004

This year's count took place at the earliest possible date, May 8th. As predicted it was a very good count, although not a record breaker. We had 7,531 birds of 146 species. It will always amaze me when the results are so similar to previous counts. For example in 2003 we counted 7,531 birds and in 2000 we counted 7,199 birds. The exception to this was the record-setting year of 2002 when 12,626 birds of 171 species were counted. For those of you who like to speculate about the possible number of birds that can be seen in northern Louisiana during a single day count that we call a "Big Day" that 171 species would be a noteworthy accomplishment. The highest interior location "Big Day" I know of is around 150 species.

Our participation level was high again, with 20 people enjoying the good weather and good birding. The biggest disappointment was, as usual, the small count of

warbler species. We always have some, but never enough. Vireos were present in good numbers. On the same day that "Smarty Jones" won the second jewel of the Triple Crown at the Preakness, we had a race too.

Here's the call: the high numbers count within a species was claimed once again by that front running horse, neatly trimmed in yellow and black with the name of **Dickissel** (635), with **Cattle Egret** (592) losing by a nose (I mean beak), and the white show horse was **Great Egret** (475). "Also rans" with red/yellow epaulets were **Red-winged Blackbird** (420), the red silks of **Northern Cardinal** (313), a gray horse trimmed in white **Northern Mockingbird** (271), high flying **Purple Martin** (228), a speckled dark horse **European Starling** (207), a somber **Morning Dove** (199), and a popular newcomer carrying a heavy load up front, **American White Pelican** (176). The most interesting new horse in the race was the unexpected late entry of **Purple Gallinule** sponsored by Red River stables. Horses of that color have not been seen up here for over forty years. One horse entered by Claiborne Parish Racing Association was wearing a cockade of red as part of its **Red-cockaded Woodpecker** silk colors. A less stunning bay entry from DeSoto Parish, the likes of which is seldom seen in these parts was a **Bachman's Sparrow**. Thank you for coming to the races. I hope you will return again next year. *An inside tip - place your money on the horse trimmed in yellow and black.*

Fort Hood and Songbirds – A Lesson in Peaceful Coexistence

The afternoon of Saturday, May 1, 2004, found our group of 15 birders in Killeen, Texas, gateway to Fort Hood. The morning's rain had ended, leaving overcast skies, temperatures in the low 60's, and 15-to-25 mph winds. Expecting the typical spring weather of central Texas in early May (warm to hot), we had arrived unprepared for this chilling aberration. However, undaunted by the conditions, we donned every layer of clothing we could find and set out with our guide, Rich Kostecke of The Nature Conservancy of Texas' Fort Hood field office. Since our Fort Hood trip was not until Sunday, we were taking the opportunity to visit some of the other beautiful birding areas in the vicinity.

Our birding began at Chalk Ridge Falls Park on the Lampasas River in Bell County. From the parking lot, the trail follows the river through a canyon. As the green waters of the Lampasas descended into the canyon over the 20-foot falls, a boardwalk and a series of steps took us from one level to another. We crossed a suspension

footbridge over the river and found ourselves on a shady woodland trail bordered by pale blue dayflower (*Commelina communis*) and spiderwort (*Tradescantia spp.*). Appropriately, a **Canyon Wren** called as did a **Yellow-billed Cuckoo**. A **Yellow-throated Vireo** flew back and forth feeding a fledgling perched on a branch high in a tree overlooking the river. We held our collective breaths when the fledgling seemed to fall from its perch and were much relieved when it fluttered to safety on a lower branch. The vireo was a life bird for Herb Pearce, who, in a reversal of the birds' spring migration, had flown south from Arlington, Massachusetts, to combine a visit to his mother in Shreveport with a birding trip. Other birds seen by members of our group included **Red-eyed Vireo**, **Ovenbird**, and **Least Flycatcher**.

Our next stop was Union Grove WMA, located a short distance from Chalk Ridge Falls on Stillhouse Hollow Reservoir. The reservoir was formed by the impoundment of the Lampasas River. A walk down a long road led us to a point where the waters of the lake lapped the shore at our feet. Braving the wind, **Dickissels** sang as they clung to the small trees swaying beside the road. An **Osprey** hunted for fish near the dam. Having viewed the **American Coots** on the lake, Jean Trahan and I decided to look for rails and bitterns as the reeds along the road seemed like good habitat. Not only did we find neither rail nor bittern, but in the process of our search, we managed to miss getting to see a **Peregrine Falcon** and a **Franklin's Gull** in breeding plumage, which were spotted over the water. Janis Harrison continued to demonstrate her lightning-quick ability to set up her spotting scope, focus it on the intended subject bird, and take a great picture with her digital camera held up to the eyepiece in about the time the rest of us were taking to get our binoculars focused on said bird.

We dined that evening at the historic Stagecoach Inn in Salado. The Inn was built in the 1860's at the crossroads of the Chisholm Trail and the Old Military Road, which linked a chain of forts. Our waitress, who has been at the Inn for over 40 years, recited the menu to us as did the local housewives who once met the stagecoaches and cattle drives so many years ago. There were now 16 of us as Jim Ingold had arrived in time for dinner.

On Sunday Rich met us at 6:00 a.m. to escort us onto Fort Hood. There we met our host, Gil Eckrich, who is the Outreach Coordinator for the Army's Natural Resources Management Branch on Fort Hood. Gil and Rich lead many birding tours on Fort Hood every year and we felt very fortunate to have such knowledgeable and hospitable guides. David Cimprich, who oversees

the monitoring of Fort Hood's **Black-capped Vireo** population for The Nature Conservancy, joined us for part of the day. David spoke to the Bird Study Group in February of his work at Fort Hood.

Fort Hood, the U.S. Army's largest tank training installation, lies in Bell and Coryell Counties in the eco-region known as the Lampasas Cut Plain. The same type of limestone rocks that underlie the Edwards Plateau extend northward beyond the Colorado River to form the Lampasas Cut Plain, but the topography differs from the Edwards Plateau. Wide alluvial valleys lie between mesa uplands and the area is primarily grassland with scattered mesquite woods. Although eastern birds predominate, a number of western species are also present and canyon land species can be found on the rocky slopes.

Fort Hood's specialties are the endangered **Black-capped Vireo** and **Golden-cheeked Warbler** and over 25% of its almost 220,000 acres is managed for the recovery of these two species. One of the management techniques employed is **Brown-headed Cowbird** control. The cowbird once followed the bison, eating the seeds the bison uncovered and laying eggs in the nests of other birds, which would raise the cowbird chicks after the bison and the cowbirds moved on. The effect of this parasitism was local and did not significantly impact the host species. The trouble began when stay-at-home cattle replaced the roving bison. The proliferation of lawns and lawnmowers has also increased cowbird habitat. Cowbird populations have spiraled upward while the populations of many of the host birds have gone in the opposite direction. Some species have coped better than others. The **Golden-cheeked Warbler** can sometimes successfully rear a cowbird chick and one of its own, but this still reduces the number of warbler young. The smaller vireo is unable to tend both the cowbird chick and its own young, so the larger, often earlier-born cowbird chick is the one who survives. Fort Hood has taken the lead in humane cowbird control and its methods are being copied in other areas. In 1987, there were only 85 pairs of **Black-capped Vireo** on Fort Hood. Today, the conservative estimate is that there are at least 3,000 **Black-capped Vireo** pairs along with several thousand **Golden-cheeked Warblers**. These birds make up the largest breeding populations of both species under single land ownership and include 16-18% of the known vireo population. The importance of Fort Hood's conservation policies to the continued existence of these two species is apparent.

While the habitat of the **Golden-cheeked Warbler** is the dense forest of mature Ashe juniper and mixed hardwood on the steep slopes and canyon walls, the

Black-capped Vireo prefers a mid-successional, shrubby oak-juniper habitat on the mesa tops.

Disturbance in the form of fire or clearing is critical to maintain this open, low-growing habitat. Periodic prescribed burns and mechanical clearing are the

methods used. A major fire on Fort Hood in 1996, which was accidentally started by artillery, created much good vireo habitat. While the vireos are wintering in Mexico, tanks lumbering through the area on training exercises even help to maintain the habitat by knocking down growth. This "pruning" results in lower and more luxuriant growth. Surprising to us is the ability of the warblers and vireos to adapt to the noise and activity levels on parts of the installation as evidenced by successful nesting right next to some of the busiest areas.

The **Painted Bunting** is another species that has profited from its association with Fort Hood. Gil Eckrich told us that when he first started surveying **Painted Bunting** populations on Fort Hood, he was lucky to find five in a day. Now Gil was able to promise us that we would see more **Painted Buntings** than we had ever seen before in one place and did he ever deliver on that promise! This was a life bird for Barbara Kiser and, as Barbara's husband Don pointed out, unlike many life bird sightings where you get one brief glimpse and the bird is gone, Barbara saw her life bird over and over and over throughout the day, in the trees, in the bushes, and flying across the road. In fact, it was the most abundant bird seen on the trip.

Although it required most of the day for everyone in our party to get really satisfying looks at our target species, **Black-capped Vireo** and **Golden-cheeked Warbler**, it was well worth it to see these beautiful little birds. The habitat on Fort Hood is quite diverse and we must have driven or tramped through samplings of all of it as our trip list indicates. Some of the other birds sighted included **Greater Roadrunner**, **Wild Turkey**, **Eastern Kingbird**, **Western Kingbird**, **Olive-sided Flycatcher**, **Scissor-tailed Flycatcher**, **Eastern Bluebird**, **White-eyed Vireo**, **Ruby-crowned Kinglet**, **Blue-gray Gnatcatcher**, **Blue Grosbeak**, **Indigo Bunting**, **Black-chinned Hummingbird**, **Common Raven**, and **Mississippi Kite**. A male **Lazuli Bunting**

was sighted on top of one of the mesas. A male **Vermilion Flycatcher**, one of a pair of nesting birds, was a life bird for Amanda Carroll and a reminder of a winter friend for those of us who have frequented Shreveport's C. Bickham Dickson Park the past few years. Happily, since our visit, **Vermilion Flycatcher** chicks have been reported. A wetlands area known as "The Willows" held **Green Heron, Great Blue Heron, Great Egret, Spotted Sandpiper, Blue-winged Teal, Yellow-billed Cuckoo,** and **Summer Tanager**. Here Brian Wilson pointed out a **Common Nighthawk** asleep on a fat tree branch.

Myriad wildflowers were in bloom and we kept Gil and Rich busy identifying them for us. Yellow flax (*Linum rigidum*), sensitive briar (*Schrankia uncinata*), wine cups (*Callirhoe digitata*), Indian Blanket (*Gaillardia pulchella*), and, of course, Texas bluebonnet (*Lupinus texensis*) jostled for space.

In 1997 Fort Hood received The Nature Conservancy's President's Conservation Achievement Award. The award is given in recognition of "exceptional support by individuals and organizations working in partnership with the Conservancy to protect biodiversity". I believe those of us who participated in this trip would say it was well deserved. Other BSG members and guests who made the trip were Jerry Bertrand, Pat Seagar, Mike Baranski, Elaine Wilson, Jeff Trahan, and Louis and Loretta Soulé.

BSG Science Fair Award

LIFETIME SERVICE AWARD

1. The award shall be called the "Lifetime Service Award." The award shall be named in honor of the first recipient. (The Will Smolenski Lifetime Service Award)
2. Nominees for the award must have served as an officer, board member, committee chair and/or in another significant capacity for a minimum of ten years.
3. Nominees must have made significant contributions to the Bird Study Group or have had a major positive influence in the success of the Bird Study Group.
4. The award will be a plaque and an appropriate gift with value up to \$100.
5. The selection committee for the Lifetime Service Award shall be the board of directors of the Shreveport Society for Nature Study, Bird Study Group.
6. A majority vote of the selection committee is needed to approve the award.
7. Nominations in writing will describe the services of the nominee. Any Bird Study Group member in good standing can make nominations to the selection committee.
8. The Lifetime Service Award shall be the premier recognition award of the Bird Study Group.
9. The Bird Study Group will maintain a permanent plaque at the Bird Study Group headquarters with the names of all the recipients of the Lifetime Service Award inscribed thereon.

PRESIDENT'S AWARD

1. The award shall be called the "President's Award."
2. The purpose is to recognize persons, families, companies, and/or organizations that enhance or take special measures to promote birding and/or the Bird Study Group in northwestern Louisiana.
3. The award will be an appropriate gift not to exceed \$50 in value.
4. The selection committee for the President's Award shall be the board of directors of the Shreveport Society for Nature Study, Bird Study Group.
5. A majority vote of the selection committee is needed to approve the award.
6. Nominations in writing will describe why the Bird Study Group should recognize the nominee. Any Bird Study Group member in good standing can make nominations to the selection committee.

Birding Ethics*by Lily Poole*

With many new birders joining our group. I would like to call to attention the Principles of Birding Ethics by the American Birding Association.

This code of ethics gives guidelines every birder should abide by. The code states everyone who enjoys birds and birding must always respect wildlife, its environment, and the rights of others. In any conflict of interest between birds and birders, the welfare of the birds and their environment comes first. According to the code birders should: promote the welfare of birds and their environment, avoid stressing birds or exposing them to danger, respect the law and the rights of others, ensure that feeders, nest structures, and other artificial bird environments are safe, respect the interests, rights, and skills of fellow birders, and freely share their knowledge and experience.

Minutes of the Board Meeting

May 4, 2004

Museum of Life Sciences at LSUS

Board members participating in the meeting were, Lily Poole, Jerry Bertrand, Jeff Trahan, Linda Adrion, Hubert Hervey, Nancy Menasco, Michele Andrews, Mac Hardy, and Amanda Crnkovic.

Treasurer's Report – Jean Trahan was not present, but had delivered the treasurer's report to Lily Poole. Copies were made and distributed to the board members. Highlights of the report follow. For the month ending April 30, the club had \$3,481.98 in the bank. In addition we had \$218.98 and \$249.53 in prepaid expenses at the post office and LSUS printing, respectively. The fund balance is \$3,950.49. Also, Jerry Bertrand reported that Rhonda Clay has returned the \$50.00 honorarium for speaking at the April meeting. In doing so, she suggested that the BSG use it for the care of the educational birds and rehab animals at Walter B. Jacobs Park. This use of the honorarium was approved by the board.

Old Business – The nominations committee chaired by Amanda Crnkovic reported their recommendations for nominees for the board. They are Ann McLaurin, Rosemary Seidler, Nancy Menasco, Ron Martin, and either Larry Raymond or Nan Franks. A motion to

accept the nominations of the board was made, seconded, and approved.

New Business – Lily Poole started a discussion on the Lifetime Achievement Award. The board agreed that the rules for the Will Smolenski Lifetime Service Award should be published in the newsletter. The award should be presented at the December meeting.

Hot Spots – The Hot Spots publication is almost ready. Twenty-five have been sold before publication.

He said that this is probably an NAMC record for this area. Hubert also observed a **Bachman’s Sparrow** north of Smyrna on Saturday and he reported that Charlie Lyon and Terry Davis recently saw two **Common Ground-Doves** on Wells Island Road. Jim Ingold reported **Bobolinks** observed during the NAMC on Thunder Road near Gilliam. Jean Trahan

said that there were nesting **Inca Doves** in her neighbor’s yard.

BIRD REPORT – *compiled May 18, 2004*

Use the bird report to see what other birders have been seeing and where to go find the bird you want to see. Observers are abbreviated by the first and last initials. Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer's initials. Sightings are arranged by species. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of the observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds they observed, etc. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used for both 1 bird and for numbers not reported by the observer. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.

Report bird records for the newsletter to Mac Hardy by the 15th of each month. All bird records reported here are observations of the observers and are therefore the responsibility of the observer.

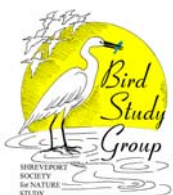
