UPCOMING FIELD TRIPS AND EVENTS

Beginning birders are welcome on all field trips. Membership in the BSG is encouraged but is not required for participation in field trips. Field trips will **LEAVE** the designated meeting place at the time posted for each field trip. Plan to arrive early for field trip orientation and any carpooling/caravanning arrangements.

What to bring on field trips: binoculars, two-way radios, scope, if you have one, snacks, and drinks. In case of bad weather, contact the designated leader to see if the field trip will take place.

CHENEYVILLE – SANDHILL CRANES

Meet at the LSUS Museum of Life Sciences. Tour the back roads of the Cheneyville-LeCompte area by car to see **Sandhill Cranes**, waterfowl, waders, and shorebirds wintering in the rice fields. Bring a lunch to eat in the car.

ELEVENTH ANNUAL GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT

Friday, February 15 – Monday, February 18, 2008

The Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) is eleven! The annual four-day count has expanded past the backyard to include anywhere you choose to bird. It's free and birders of all ages and degree of expertise can participate. We encourage you to consider getting

involved this year. To learn more about the count and to enter your reports, go to www.birdsource.org/gbbc.

The BSG database lists over 175 species that have been found in our area in the month of February, including rarities. Download a February (or any other monthly) checklist from the BSG website at: www.birdstudygroup.org/SelectMoCheck.html.

Complete instructions for participation are available on the GBBC website, but the guidelines are simple: For each day of the count period, report the highest number of a particular species recorded at each location you bird. For example, on day one of the count, in your backyard you have one **Northern Cardinal** at 10:00 a.m., five at noon, and two at 2:00 p.m. You report five **Northern Cardinals** for your backyard (the highest number present at one time) for day one. You go birding the same day at C. Bickham Dickson Park, where you spot six cardinals in one location. You report six **Northern Cardinals** for C. Bickham Dickson Park. You start all over again for days two, three, and four.

Record entry is easy. Go to www.birdcount.org and click on the icon "**Submit your bird checklist**" near the top of the page. Fill out the questions about your location, local habitat, and count duration. Then enter your high counts for each species sighted for that day and location. You can submit one bird checklist for each day that you count or for each new area that you count in. For example:

- If you count on four days at one location, you'd submit four different checklists.
- If you count on four days at two different locations each day, submit eight checklists. And so on.

You are invited to help count birds during the 11th Annual Great Backyard Bird Count at the Red River National Wildlife Refuge Headquarters in Bossier City. Come walk the trails in the pecan grove or try out the new trail along the river.

Schedule of Activities:

8:00 a.m. until – Breakfast with the Birds. Doughnuts, shade-grown coffee, hot tea, and hot chocolate.

8:15 a.m. – Bird Walk. Children accompanied by an adult are welcome.

All Day – Feeder watch, walking trails, informal refuge tours.

Directions to the refuge: From the intersection of US 71 (Barksdale Boulevard) and Jimmie Davis Highway (LA 511) in Bossier City, go south about one-half mile on US 71 and turn right (west) on Sunflower Road. Proceed to the end of the road; the gravel/dirt road through the gate across the cattle guard leads into the refuge. You'll see the Red River National Wildlife Refuge entrance sign as you enter. The Headquarters Unit is currently closed to the public except for special events, such as the Great Backyard Bird Count event.

It is 1.1 miles west of the intersection of Leonard Road and LA 1 and 0.9 miles east of the intersection of Leonard Road and Ellerbe Road. Come and go as you like.

The winning team will be the team with the highest number of listed species (verified by at least two team members) when the competition ends at 12:00 noon. The event will culminate with lunch (Dutch treat for the losers) at the winning team's choice of restaurant. The losing teams will chip in to buy lunch for the winning team.

ABOUT THE BIRDS AND THE BEES

I

The old man remembers happy days as a boy sitting on the front porch of the old home and watching the Chimney Swifts. They nested in the brick chimney that was responsible for keeping much of the house warm in the winter. This was summertime, and the living was not exactly easy, but it was good. They didn't even know they were living in the "good old days", but compared to today . . . they were. Just before dark the swifts would fly in a circular pattern, with the chimney as the approximate center, and then pitch into the dark sooty area below to spend the night on their hard mud nests. Nests brought in small, muddy beak full by small, muddy beak full following showers when mud could be found. Their chattering was a pleasant sound, in those days before television dominated the night sounds.

The Chimney Swifts (birds) definitely had a strong attachment to the honey bees (bees) living in the hollow oak tree directly in front of the porch swing where the boy often sat. There was an opening in the leaves of the tree that the boy was watching. The bees had to return to their hive by crossing that opening. The birds knew this. The birds and the bees were on a collision course. Flying full speed ahead the swift would open its mouth very wide, and a bee would splat on the back of the birds open maw. No time to activate the stinger, just *sphlatt*.

This happened all day long, to a seemingly endless supply of bees. He knew a little about the birds and the bees.

II

As the boy grew older he acquired some pigeons. He enjoyed listening to them, as the male strutted about cooing to the female of his choice. Billing and cooing was invented by pigeons, copied by people. He built a special pen for his pigeons behind the hen house, where they would be safe from owls, and other night predators. He also looked forward to the time of eating fried squab. He had heard that the dark meat was as good as Morning Dove, and you didn't have to worry about biting down on a bird shot pellet. As we will see, he never found out if squab was good or not.

He learned about bee keeping. He had a dozen bee hives he would rob every summer. This provided sweetening for the many desserts that his mother prepared for the family of five. A sixth was to come along later. The aviary (birds) was located a little in front of the apiary (bees), in the pecan orchard. His mother had developed a special recipe for pecan pie, using honey from his bees and pecans from the orchard. He had to protect the pecan crop from the marauding crows. They would carry off the entire crop if not held in check with the aid of a shotgun. A hive of black bees had been successfully removed from a post oak tree in the wood lot. The tree had been split into fence posts by a tenant farmer. He learned to waste nothing on the farm. The wild bees had delivered many a sting to the boy as they defended their queen and honey supply, but he managed to get them moved to the apiary.

The time for collecting the honey had arrived. The boy filled his smoker with soiled rags, and got a good smoke going with every puff of the bellows. He wore his sting proof gloves, bee hat and veil, and coveralls carefully tucked inside his rubber boots. He thought he was safe, even from the vicious wild bees. All went well with the tame, yellow, Italian bees. Puff smoke, let bees calm down, open hive with hive tool, remove frames loaded with honey, brush off bees, leave frames with brood comb, and replace removed frames with new frames filled with wired foundation wax. No problem; until he got to the black bees' hive. The smoker just barely held the angry bees at bay as they peered through the cracks between the frames at the top of the hive. Five thousand pairs of eyes watched and waited for a chance to fly out and employ five thousand stingers in protection of their queen and honey (God and Country). The unforgettable sound of angry buzzing bees increased. A gap in the

cloud of smoke showed the black bees an opening. His coveralls had a slit in the side for access to inside pants pockets. It was summer and all the boy had on under the coveralls were his BVD's. Seeing this weakness in his defense, the bees swarmed in promptly employing those stingers. Forgetting all thought of robbing bees, the boy took off running trailed by a swarm of angry bees. He left many of the bees behind when he ran through a fig tree with its many trunks. This knocked his hat and veil off. Now the remaining bees could attack his head as well as his torso. As he ran, he slung off the thick sting proof gloves. He needed his hands for crushing wild bees. One hundred yards in record time, and the bees still chased and stung. Another hundred yards and he ran out of the coveralls, so he could kill those inside bees. He could not outrun the bees; puffing, he backed up against a big pecan tree trunk. With his backside protected he swatted the bees, until none were left. He had over twenty stings, and his body was reacting badly to so much poison. Within a year, he learned he had developed a severe sensitivity to bee sting poison and had to give up beekeeping.

But the bees were not finished, because this is a story about the birds - and the bees. The bees turned their anger on the pigeons and the birds went into a panic. The boy saw his pigeons flying wildly, followed by lines of bees. There was no escape from the bees. By night time all of the pigeons were dead, stung to death by the angry native black bees. He never raised pigeons again. He returned the black bees to the wild. The boy knew a little more about the birds and the bees, but not all.

Minutes of the Regular Meeting
January 8, 2008, 6:30 p.m.
Museum of Life Sciences at LSUS

Program—Paul Miliotis presented an interesting talk on dragonflies and damselflies.

Newsletter—The president, Amanda Lewis, implored club members to contribute articles for publication in the newsletter. Articles should be sent to the newsletter editor, Jim Ingold.

Field Trips—Nancy Menasco reviewed upcoming field trips. Nancy will lead an owl prowl on January 19. Jim Ingold will lead a trip to Cheneyville in search of **Sandhill Cranes** on February 19. Saturday, February 23, is the date for the bird banding at the Dickson deer farm on Leonard Road. Also, the LOS winter meeting will be held the last weekend in January in Alexandria. Terry Davis then said that he will be leading a field trip to the Shreveport Regional Airport Saturday, January 12, to search for **Smith’s Longspurs**. Terry said that this field trip will involve strenuous walking with little access to restrooms.

Bird Talk—Jeff Trahan reported several good birds at Bickham Dickson Park. They are **Surf Scoter, Eared Grebe, Semipalmated Plovers, and Henslow’s Sparrow**. Rosemary Seidler said that Bickham Dickson Park has plenty of ducks this year. Paul Miliotis reported that he and Matt White saw **Vaux’s Swifts** at Bickham Dickson Park and Matt White obtained good photographs of them. Neither Paul nor Matt heard them vocalize. Jean Trahan reported that she and Jeff Trahan saw some unusual species on the Bossier-Caddo-Bienville Christmas Bird Count. She said that they saw four immature **Bald Eagles, Black-necked Stilts, seven Plegadis ibis, and Great-tailed Grackles**. Terry Davis said that he and Jeff Trahan got high counts of several birds last week including 648 **White-crowned Sparrows** in the vicinity of Elm Grove in south Bossier Parish. Jim Ingold reported about 60 **House Sparrows** at his bird feeders in Bossier City. Ellen Middleton said that she has two **Red-breasted Nuthatches** coming to her feeders in Broadmoor Terrace.

BIRD REPORT – compiled February 7, 2008

Use the bird report to see what other birders have been seeing and where to go find the bird you want to see. Observers are abbreviated by the first and last initials. Dates and localities of observations are summarized under the observer's initials. Sightings are arranged by species. Following each species is a line of data in the following format: date, initials of the observer, number of birds observed, initials of another observer, number of birds they observed, etc. For the number of birds observed, a 1 is used for both 1 bird and for numbers not reported by the observer. For example: 01/12/99 BB 2 means that on January 12, 1999, BB saw two birds. Then by looking on the observer list, located after the sightings, you can determine that BB is Bob Birder and on 1/12/99 he was birding C. Bickham Dickson Park.

Report bird records for the newsletter to Mac Hardy by the 15th of each month. All bird records reported here are observations of the observers and are therefore the responsibility of the observer.

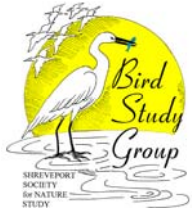

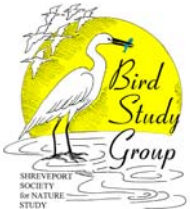
